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A BY-LAW TO AMEND BY-LAW NUMBER 46 BEING THE BY-LAW TO REGULATE TRAFFIC IN THE CITY OF CHARLOTTETOWN

BE IT ENACTED by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:

1. THAT section 26 of By-Law Number 46, a By-Law to Regulate Traffic in the City of Charlottetown, be repealed and the following substituted therefore:

"26 (f) Notwithstanding anything otherwise appearing in this By-Law if and where any street approaching an intersection is marked off into three lanes (except where Queen and Grafton Streets are so marked as they approach their intersection) every vehicle approaching and entering the intersection on such street shall proceed as follows:

(a) Vehicles turning right in the intersection shall approach in the right hand lane and turn right into the right hand lane of the intersection street, especially guarding all pedestrians.

(b) Vehicles continuing straight through the intersection shall approach in the centre line and leave the intersection in the right hand lane.

(c) Vehicles turning left in the intersection shall approach in the centre lane and turn left into the right hand lane of the intersecting street as other traffic may allow, especially guarding all pedestrians.

(d) Designation of lanes (i.e. "right-hand") is in relation to the direction of the vehicle.

2. It shall be unlawful for vehicles to make a left hand turn at the intersection of Queen and Grafton Streets.

3. Notwithstanding anything otherwise appearing in this By-Law where Queen Street and Grafton Street intersects every vehicle approaching and entering the intersection on Queen or Grafton Streets shall proceed as follows:

(a) Vehicles travelling southwardly on Queen Street and turning right on Grafton Street shall approach in the right hand lane of Queen Street and turn right into the right hand lane of Grafton Street, especially guarding all pedestrians.

(b) Vehicles travelling southwardly on Queen Street and continuing straight through the intersection of Queen and Grafton Streets shall approach in either the right hand or centre lanes of Queen Street and leave the intersection by the corresponding lane.

(c) Vehicles travelling northwardly on Queen Street and turning right on Grafton Street shall approach in the right hand lane of Queen Street and turn right into the right hand lane of Grafton Street, especially guarding all pedestrians.

(d) Vehicles travelling northwardly on Queen Street and continuing straight through the intersection of Queen and Grafton Streets shall approach in the right hand lane and leave the intersection in the right hand lane.

(e) Vehicles travelling eastwardly on Grafton Street and turning right on Queen Street shall approach in the right hand lane of Grafton Street and turn right into the right hand lane of Queen Street, especially guarding all pedestrians.

(f) Vehicles travelling eastwardly on Grafton Street and continuing straight through the intersection of Grafton and Queen Streets shall approach in the right hand lane and leave the intersection in the right hand lane.

(g) Vehicles travelling westwardly on Grafton Street and turning right on Queen Street shall approach in the right hand lane of Grafton Street and turn right into the right hand lane of Queen Street, especially guarding all pedestrians.

(h) Vehicles travelling westwardly on Grafton Street and continuing straight through the intersection of Grafton and Queen Streets shall approach in either the right hand or centre lane of Grafton Street and leave the intersection in the corresponding lane.

(i) Designation of lanes (i.e. "right-hand") is in relation to the direction of the vehicle.

Georgetown Town Council Holds Regular Meeting

GEORGETOWN — A considerable volume of business was conducted at the regular monthly meeting of the Georgetown Town Council, held in the Council Chambers on Monday night.

Mayor Howard S. MacLean presided and present were Councillors J.W. Lavers, Mrs. Joan Currie, James G. McConnell and Joseph E. Johnson. The Town Clerk, Mrs. Laura Murphy, read the minutes of the last regular meeting, which were adopted.

FINANCE COMMITTEE — Reporting for the Finance Committee, was Councillor Lavers, the November 30th, balance in ordinary account showed a balance of \$3469.85.

In the capital expenditure account, with all bills paid, the balance stood at \$322.56. Bills in the amount of \$1652.47 were approved for payment.

POLICE — Councillor Johnson reported for the Police and Sanitation Committee and showed that the amount of \$350 was collected in fines during November.

A letter was read by the Town Clerk from Bathurst Marine Limited, highly commending the town policeman, Constable Charles Jackson for the cooperation and work he had done for the company in a variety of matters.

ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION — Mr. Harry McConnell attended at the opening of the meeting in his capacity as President of the Georgetown Athletic Association and conveyed to the Council the interest of his association and of several service clubs in the town in the seasonal operation of the rink, especially for the use of the school children and pre-school age children.

The council on two different occasions called tenders for the operation of the rink and no tenders were received. It was decided at Monday's meeting that the rink would be given out to the Georgetown Centennial Committee for the 1966-67 season and that the town, as their contribution would pay the electric light bill and the Centennial Committee and the other organizations that might be working with it would pay the costs of any labor and heating involved.

WELFARE — Councillor Currie reporting for Welfare and Street Lights, brought the council up to date on welfare payments and applications, and also stated that a street light had been installed on Gordon Street, between Fitzroy Street and Weeks Crescent.

Councillor McConnell, Chairman of the Public Property Committee stressed the need of certain repairs to the rink building and the council authorized the expenditure of an amount not in excess of \$400 for those repairs.

WINTER WORKS — The town's winter works programme has received approval in the amount of \$4000. The clerk briefed the council on certain aspects and regulations governing the employment of workers under the winter works programme. A considerable amount of correspondence was before the meeting and included letters from Bathurst Marine Limited, Laurie A. Coles and Associates, various departments of government, Canadian National Railways and individuals.

SEWAGE LATERALS — The last four sewage laterals were installed recently and the town was informed by the Department of Public Works that the amount of \$3900 would be allowed for the connecting up of the sewage system to serve the Court House and Kings County Jail.

On the Town's sewage system installation, the contractor security deposit cheque will now be returned to the contractor. A letter was received from the Senior Citizens Housing Corporation informing the council that the matter of financial remuneration for sewage facilities provided would be decided upon in the very near future.

AUTHORITY, CLERK — The council authorized the clerk to write the Hon. Gordon Bennett and the Hon. George Ferguson, requesting that they give serious consideration to the building of one or more Senior Citizens Housing Units in Georgetown. It was pointed out that due to the fact that Georgetown had not entered the field of Senior Citizens Housing until last year, that there now exists a great need for housing in Georgetown and that the present Senior Citizens home has released five houses for occupation by industrial workers. A considerable number of applications for residences in Senior Citizens Homes have been received by the council. It was therefore felt that this particular area is in a special category in this regard, and it is hoped that the authorities will give every consideration to the local situation and housing needs.

The clerk was also authorized to write the Premier regarding the tremendous adverse financial effect the recent closing of Gulf Garden Foods Plant, had on Georgetown and Kings County, and to request him to do all possible in any future negotiations, relative to the re-opening of this industry.

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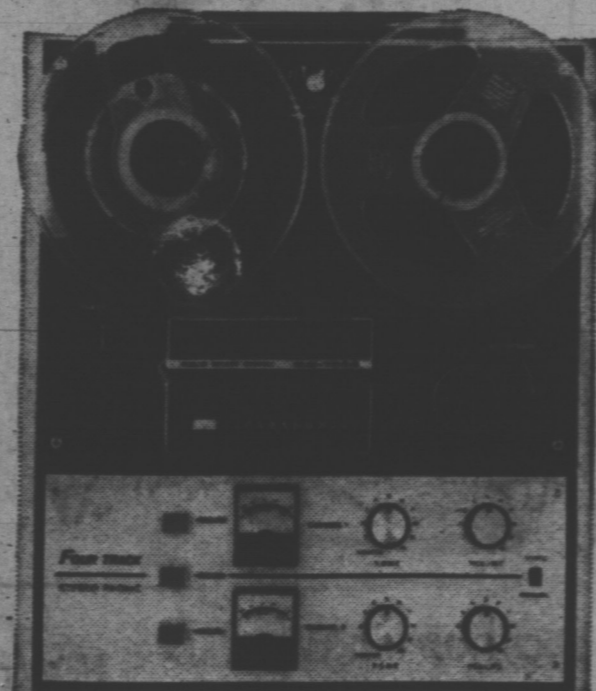
