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### Knights Down Kinsmen 8-1 For Second Victory In Junior Ball League

The Knights of Columbus Juniors aided by some sloppy fielding on the part of the Kinsmen team last night won their second straight start of the Junior League when they were handed an 8-1 victory. The game was a seven inning affair played on the Memorial Field diamond before a large crowd of fans.

The two pitchers in the game gave up a total of five hits and the winners were credited with six unearned runs. The losers' lone run was of the earned variety.

In the opening inning the Kinsmen had the bases loaded with two out but failed to register a run. The Knights scored three times without a hit. Three errors, two walks and a wild pitch and three stolen bases paved the way for the markers. They added three more in the next frame on a hit batter, a walk, two more misplays and a brace of wild heaves. They matched the Kinsmen's tally in the opening half of the third by scoring a singleton on an error, a stolen base and another wild pitch. The Kinsmen scored their marker by the same route. The K. C. team scored their final run in the last of the sixth on a hit, a walk, an infield out and a passed ball.

Benny Carson for the losers and Merlin "Red" MacKenzie for the Knights were the opposing hurlers. Carson was touched for two

hits, walked six, hit two more and struck out four batters. MacKenzie allowed three hits, walked six, hit two and whiffed ten Kinsmen batters.

Jackie Cairns, shortstop for the losers, was the game's leading hitter, getting two singles in three times at bat. George MacNeil made a beautiful running catch off Reggie Hughes' drive in the fourth. He ran with his back to the infield to haul down a ball that had hit written all over it. Glen Matheson was heaved out of the ball game by plate umpire Cecil Ward for protesting too vigorously a decision on a called strike.

Judging from the large turnout at last night's hockey meeting held at the Legion Hall, it looks like the general trend towards Charlottetown wanting to see Big Four hockey back here next season, is definitely in the affirmative. Despite the fact that a Junior Baseball League game was in progress, some seventy-five or more interested citizens were present at the meeting to discuss the possibilities of Charlottetown's entry in the M. S. H. L.

Many of those present included prominent business and professional men in addition to many players, fans and John Q. Public, who all indicated a keen interest in the project at hand. That of interesting the sporting blood in this City and in other parts of the Province in supporting senior hockey here; to ascertain whether the interest received will warrant the continuance of the proposal, and to devise ways and means of making it a successful venture.

One thing that impressed this writer most, was the fact that in choosing a committee to organize a drive to find out how many people would be willing to purchase tickets for the games in advance in order to provide a working capital for the project, not one of the eleven men, nominated from the floor to act as a voluntary member of the committee, refused the appointment.

And it is a well picked committee too, that should do much to organize and carry out the drive to its ultimate success. Of course this doesn't mean that they are the only ones who will do the canvassing. They are just the basic organizers who will enlist the services of others in groups and teams to carry it out. There was also plenty of evidence of the additional help in the form of working capital for the project. Major T. B. Rogers, nearly everyone present at the meeting readily gave their names to the appointed secretary, Ivan Sinclair, as prospective workers and supporters in the interest of the cause.

Although it is not our intention to be critical, unless it be in a constructive way, it nevertheless has to be admitted that the second game of the City Junior Baseball League, played last evening between Knights of Columbus and Kinsmen at Memorial Field, produced anything but an interesting game to watch. In fact at times, was almost pitiful to watch.

In the first two innings of play, the fans saw a Kinsmen team toss a ball just about everywhere in the infield except the right. There they saw the Knights straight victory, up their second straight victory, score six times in those same innings, all of the unearned variety, without tagging a single hit off a hard-working Benny Carson on the Kinsmen mound. There were so many misuses, including overthrows and straight fumbles, hit batters, walks, passed balls, and suchlike in four innings of play, that this writer packed up and went home.

Maybe we should have waited longer. We understand that it did improve some, but not to any great extent in the course of the following three innings. In the course of the game the Kinsmen came through with three hits, one run and six errors, while the Knights had two hits, scored eight runs, and committed four errors.

It can't be blamed on the pitchers, Merlin "Red" MacKenzie of the Knights and Carson of the losers, the total of only five hits in the entire game will testify to that. Therefore, it has to be laid at the feet of the infielders, considering that all ten of the errors were committed by players in those positions.

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**WEDNESDAY JULY 12th Plan To Attend**

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### Committee Named To Investigate Possibility Of Senior Hockey Team

With some 75 or more interested hockey enthusiasts in attendance, a very successful meeting was held at the Legion Hall last evening to explore the possibilities of entering a Charlottetown team in the Maritime Senior Hockey League next winter. The meeting was presided over by Major T. B. Rogers, who was appointed chairman from the floor. Mr. Ivan Sinclair was also appointed secretary for the meeting.

The prime purpose of last night's meeting was to sound out the general public's reaction to such a venture and to ascertain as to whether or not they would be willing to back such a project. Although there were many suggestions made, questions asked and information on the set-up given, probably the biggest accomplishment at the meeting was the formation of an all-man committee to head and organize a canvass of the general public both in the City and other sections of the Province, to sell season or part-season tickets for next winter's games.

The committee was nominated from the floor, and the following are its members:—Major T. B. Rogers, chairman, Messrs. B. M. Sears, Leo Callaghan, James Brown, William Boyles, William Brown, Roddie MacDonald, Walter Lawlor, W. E. Scantlebury, Wes "Bucko" Trainer, and E. D. Reid.

The object of the canvass is to approach the public with the purpose of securing a pledge to buy tickets or seats either by the game, or for the full or part season which would be paid for over a period of four months, namely August to November. It is expected that this canvass will indicate whether the people want to see "Big Four" hockey and at the same time raise a working capital to carry on with the project in the selecting of a team, etc.

The committee will hold their first meeting tonight at seven o'clock in the office of Major Rogers to get the organization of their drive underway. One of the leading citizens at the meeting was Dr. Ira J. Yeo, President of the Charlottetown Forum, who explained many aspects concerning the project. He intimated that if the program goes through, the admission fees will be \$1.50, \$1.00 and 85 cents, and that the team's cut of the gate would be seventy-five per cent. Dr. Yeo stated that in talks with Judge J. Elliott Hudson, President of the M.S.H.L., it was indicated that they would consider Charlottetown's entry in the league, but that certain requirements would have to be met, one being that the League would have to be assured that the calibre of players on the team would meet present League standards, and that a definite application for entry would have to be made by June 25th. He also stated that President Hudson would make application to the M.A.H.A. to allow Charlottetown 10 imported players instead of the regular six, which he believed would be granted.

In regard to scouting outside talent for the team, Dr. Yeo said that Mr. Tommy Gorman, owner of the Ottawa Senators Hockey Club, said that he could provide a team for Charlottetown that would meet "Big Four" requirements, and "one you will be proud of." He said that Ray Getliffe, who is well-known here for his former days here when he performed in the "Big Four" for this City, had made a similar offer.

Many other spokesmen were heard from during the meeting, and all gave the general impression that they were keenly interested in the development of the project, and made many helpful suggestions concerning the matter.

In regard to bringing back eligible Island hockey talent to play with Charlottetown, Major Rogers said that "every effort would be made to bring back local players who will fit into the picture."

One of the Island's leading hockey products, Wes "Bucko" Trainer, who has been playing in the United States Professional Hockey League both before and after he made the N.H.L. two years ago with New York Rangers, on being asked said "I am not planning on continuing my professional career, and I would be glad to play for Charlottetown if my amateur status can be regained."
