More Earthquake Shocks.

SAVANNAH, Ga., Oct. 22. Savannah was visited by two distinct earthquake shocks to-day. The first at 4.55 a. m., was of 15 or 20 seconds duration, and excited a good deal of apprehension, but no general alarm was caused by it. At 2.20 p. m. another vibration, accompanied by a rumbling noise was felt. Many claim that these shocks were almost as severe as any experienced here, except the great shock of Aug. 31st.

CHARLESTON, Oct. 22. There was a sharp earthquake shock here at 5.28 o'clock this morning.

The Munro Bursaries.

HALIFAX, Oct. 22. Mr. Lewis, of Moncton, who hails from Fredericton Normal School, stands ninth among the fourteen prize winners for the junior Munro bursaries in Dalhousie College. He takes \$300. The students from Pietou Academy lead, and the boys sent up from that institution capture \$2,900 in money prizes. Prince of Wales College, Charlottetown, takes \$800. Senior exhibitions—George McLeod, Stewart. Junior exhibitions—Schurman, McLeod.

The Iman Steamship Company.

LONDON, Oct. 22. At a meeting of the creditors of the Iman Steamship Co., to-day, it was resolved to sell the concern to the International Steam Navigation Co., for the sum of £205,000. The liabilities of the Iman to secured creditors amount to £174,500 and these to unsecured creditors to £91,000, including trademen's bills, aggregating £49,300. The unsecured creditors will receive a little over ten shillings on the pound.

Movements of the Ministers.

HALIFAX, Oct. 22. The cabinet ministers left Halifax this morning. This afternoon they addressed meetings at Springhill, where 1,000 miners are employed, and to-night at Amherst. The beneficial results of the Halifax meeting are already manifested, while inspiring renewed confidence in the Conservatives, it has greatly depressed the Grits.

A Schooner Missing.

GLoucester, Oct. 22. The schooner George L. Smith sailed from this port August 14th, on a halibut voyage. She was last seen by the schr. Peregine while on Brown's Bank on the 21st. Since that time nothing has been heard from her, and consequently her owners have given her up with her crew of 14 men as lost.

Untruthful Reports.

BERLIN, Oct. 22. In response to official inquiries the German embassy at St. Petersburg telegraphs that there is no basis of truth for the story that an attempt has been made on the Czar's life, or for the report that an aide-de-camp had been shot by the Czar.

The Occupation of Bulgaria.

LONDON, Oct. 22. It is now asserted that Russia has agreed not to occupy Bulgaria, and that Austria and Germany have agreed to declare the newly elected soubzance illegal to compel the regency to resign, and to force Bulgaria to submit to Russia.

Another Assignment.

TORONTO, Oct. 22. Charles Stern, wholesale fancy goods, has assigned, with liabilities between fifty and sixty thousand dollars. The nominal assets are placed at about fifty thousand dollars.

A Fugitive's Return.

MONTREAL, Oct. 22. P. F. Robert, dry goods merchant, who failed a short time ago and left the city, has returned, fully prepared to meet all claims of his creditors.

The French Ambassador's Demand.

LONDON, Oct. 22. It is believed that M. Waddington, the French Ambassador to England, demands that Great Britain fix a definite date for her evacuation of Egypt.

Gen. Sir H. T. Macpherson Buried.

RANGOON, Oct. 22. Gen. Sir H. T. Macpherson, late commander of the British Army of occupation in Burmah, has been buried here.

The Quebec Elections.

QUEBEC, Oct. 22. St. Hilaire, the Government candidate, has been returned for Chicoutim by 875 majority. He had majorities in every division except one.

Another Big Blaze.

FARMINGTON, Me., Oct. 22. A fire broke out in Gerry's stable at 8.30 to-night, and at 2 o'clock the fire was still burning. The business part of the town is in ruins.

Didn't Know It Was Loaded.

HALIFAX, Oct. 22. A young man named Gillis was fooling with an old gun which exploded, the ball passing through his heart causing instant death.
