## Strange But True

Canada's most unusual road—  
probably the longest floating plank  
road in the world—has just ended  
34 years of service.

Built in a remote part of British  
Columbia on Graham Island in the  
North Pacific, it connected the  
two small frontier villages of Tiel  
and Port Cement, 14 miles of  
swampy terrain separated the two  
pint-sized towns. A man or beast  
venturing into it would quickly be  
carried down to a dreadful death.

However, enormous strands of  
magnificent Spruce, fir, and cedar  
grew nearby. In 1920, this timber  
was so far from market that it  
offered cheap material for building  
an unusual road to cross the bog.

With timber prices what they are  
today, such a road would cost too  
much to build even on Graham  
Island.

But 34 years ago several saw  
mills were operating there to meet  
the limited demand of the sur-  
rounding district. As a road was  
needed between the two towns,  
the government put the mills to  
work sawing logs for it. The lay  
of the land permitted the road to  
be built in a straight line. At  
every half mile sidings were laid  
so that vehicles could pull out of  
line and let the other fellow pass.

Moving sidewalks in the form of  
conveyor belts are about to give  
some footed folk a lift in Jersey,  
N. J.

The bells will go into action as  
pedestrians carriers this summer.

New Jersey citizens who use the  
Erie Railroad and then the tubes  
under the Hudson River to get to  
their jobs in New York City will  
be the first to ride the moving  
sidewalks.

The belt is capable of carrying  
approximately 11,000 tired com-  
muters an hour. The greater part  
of the belt covers a ten per cent  
grade and is supposed to ease  
pedestrian traffic jams as well  
as weary muscles. It is planned to  
operate a mile at a speed of  
120 feet a minute.

Workers in a tire and rubber  
firm in Akron, Ohio, make the  
460 foot continuous belt. It is 4  
of an inch thick and weighs 11,000  
pounds. Workers in Aurora, Illi-  
nois, turned out the 30 tons of  
equipment on which the belt rides.

Moving sidewalks, while new to  
America have been used for some  
years in Moscow, Russia.

Cruising 10,000 miles across the  
Pacific on a raft is the dream of  
Bill Willis, 60, a resident of New  
York City.

Willis, who has spent 44 years of  
his life on the seas, plans a solo  
trip. He will embark at Lima,  
Peru, for Samoa and hopes to  
make the voyage in about four  
months. He believes the west  
bound Humboldt current will carry  
his raft to its destination.

The raft, made from seven balsa  
tree trunks has twin masts and a  
tiny cabin. Willis has equipped  
the cabin with a radio receiving  
set, two magnetic compasses, and  
a large water tank. He will also  
carry a sextant and navigation  
charts. Willis has relatives living  
in Prince Edward Island.

## Speaks at Meeting

OF A H E A In Toronto

TORONTO, (CP)—A home econ-  
omist says the time has passed  
when home economics means cook-  
ing and sewing.

Mildred Horton, executive sec-  
retary of the American Home Econ-  
omics Association, said Wednes-  
day that it encompasses the en-  
tire field of nutrition and family  
living on a national and interna-  
tional scale. She told the annual  
convention of the Canadian Home  
Economics Association:

"It calls for young people with  
qualities, the aptitudes and the  
capacity for human understanding  
who will fill the jobs with com-  
petence and imagination.

"There is a crying need for  
graduates in the decorative level.  
Positions at the administrative  
level—at least here and in the  
United States—remain vacant for  
great lengths of time. Often they  
are filled by personnel outside of  
the home economics field."

She said the need is urgent for  
personnel in the field of research.
