NEW YORK

NEW YORK (AP) - The stock market went through another dull and irregular Monday session, one of many this summer. Uncertainties about labor, politics and foreign affairs were blamed for the cautious and lackluster performance of stock prices. All the leading market stocks except Studebaker, which closed unchanged, took losses as hard bargaining began between Chrysler management and the United Auto Workers. The Dow Jones industrial average lost a minor loss of 51 at 838.48. The Associated Press average of 60 stocks closed with a loss of 5 at 314.2. Chrysler, second most active issue, was off 1/4 at 97 3/4. General Motors lost 1/4, Ford 1/4 and American Motors 1/4. Steels, generally higher at the start, ended the day no better than level, despite further notice in Wall Street of the boom-in conditions in the industry. N.S. Steel gained 1/4, Bethlehem lost 1/4. As a group, copper gave about the best performance.

MONTREAL

MONTREAL (CP) - Prices were well mixed to fractionally lower on the Montreal and Canadian stock exchanges Monday. Trading was quiet with 102,500 industrial shares changing hands and 749,500 mines and oils shares. The composite index ended 0.1 to 149.7. The industrial index dropped 0.3 to 154. Moore corp. textile and Imperial Tobacco each 1/4 to 25% and 13%. Utilities gained 0 1/2 to 140.5. Maritime Telephone added 1/4 to 20 1/4. Senior base metals all were mixed. Noranda dropped 1/4 to 47 1/4 and Hudson Bay Mining 1/4 to 60 1/4. Primary metals were softer. Dominion Foundries declined 1/4 to 20 1/4. Aluminum 1/4 to 30 1/4 and Dominion Bridge 1/4 to 21. Dominion Steel added 1/4 to 16 1/4 and Canada Iron Foundries 1/4 to 28. Senior base metals all were mixed. Noranda dropped 1/4 to 47 1/4 and Hudson Bay Mining 1/4 to 60 1/4.
