LARGE BEET.—John Westaway of Georgetown has a beet which weighs 81 lbs. and girls twenty-six inches. There is also in his garden peas which are yielding second growth this season. Who can beat this!

SECOND CROP.—Mr. James Lard, of Summerside, showed the Journal a number of ripe blackberries on Monday last which he had picked from his garden that morning. These were the second crop for this year and grew on this spring's shoots.

A MALICIOUS ACT.—It is stated that a few evenings ago, a fine mare, "Chief," bred by "Allright," value £150, was maliciously killed by some evil disposed person or persons living in Brookfield or vicinity. The above valuable animal was the property of Mr. Hector McLean, of Brookfield.

NOVA SCOTIA GOLD.—Manager McQuarrie, of the Montague gold mine, brought a brick of gold to Halifax on Wednesday valued at \$3,000. He also brought some fine gold-bearing quartz taken from the Lanson lead at the Rose mine.

HALIFAX GRAIN SHIPMENTS.—The grain shipments from Halifax this winter are expected to be the heaviest that have yet passed through the elevator. The first steamer will load early in December, and it is expected that the elevator will be run to its fullest capacity.

POLICE COURT.—There were twelve Scott Act cases on the docket to-day. Mary J. McMillan was fined \$50 or one month for a first offence, and Andrew Doyle, jr., was sentenced to two months imprisonment for a third offence. Five cases were adjourned and five dismissed. On: drunk was fined \$3 or 14 days.

A HARD TICKET.—A man named Owen Nowlan was charged in the Halifax police court Tuesday morning with being a vagrant. The police book shows that he has been in court on 118 separate charges. He was fined Monday for drunkenness, and no sooner had his fine been paid than he was found dead drunk and was sent up for 90 days.

THEFTS AT WORK.—Several thefts have lately been committed in and about the Royalty. Within the past two weeks three 40-lb. tubs of butter have been stolen from Mrs. Howard, North River, and one tub from St. Dunstan's College; about a ton of hay from a stack in the field of J. J. Trainor, on the road leading to Mount Edward Road from Malpeque Road; two loads of grain from E. L. Hazard's barn; and four carcasses of lamb from Saunders & Campbell's slaughter house, Lower Malpeque Road. There is no clue to the guilty person or persons.

W. C. T. U.—We understand the W. C. T. U. intends holding another of their interesting meetings in the Y. M. C. A. Hall, on Thursday, 22d inst. Rev. Messrs. Lloyd and Sutherland being the speakers of the evening, a good time may be expected. As the temperance question is now one of interest to all, we would advise all—both for and against—to take advantage of this opportunity of hearing the subject handled in a masterly manner, by gentlemen thoroughly competent to do so. Temperance sermons will be preached from all the pulpits next Sunday.

A REVERSING BUSINESS.—The St. John Sun says: The business being carried on by the I. S. C., at present does not indicate any ill effects from the McKinley bill. The shipments from this port to Boston are heavier than last year. This is somewhat owing, it is true, to the failure of the potato crop last night the warehouse was packed and the wheat heaped high with sacks of potatoes, some 3,000 bags being piled there. They came mostly from P. E. Island, the steamer Cumberland being unable to handle all the freight, the State of Maine will make an extra trip, arriving this morning. The egg business is the best indicator of the effect, if any, of the McKinley bill, and this trade shows no falling off. There was a sort of panic for a few days, but shipments are now as large as usual. Large shipments of fish are also going forward, and the trade is booming.

Execution of Birchall.

THE EXAMINER'S telegram, giving particulars of the execution of Birchall, who was hanged this morning at 8 o'clock, was not to hand up to the time of going to press. Other telegrams are also delayed on account of a press of business on the line.

Notes and Comments.

—The Financial Times of London, commenting upon the effect of the McKinley bill, declares that there is every disposition among the commercial men on this side to meet the Canadians cordially in this matter, and the Americans, so far from hastening annexation, as they intended by the McKinley tariff, may be drawing closer the bonds of union between the Dominion and the old country.

—The Canadian Gazette, of London, G. B., has the following:—

"Cheap food the British consumer will not get, and cheap food he believes he would not get were restrictions placed upon the free importation of foreign breadstuffs and meat. It is, of course, just here that the Imperial Commercial Unionist finds the great obstacle to the success of his plans. A tariff for all parts of the Empire, by which Colonial trade would receive a preference over foreign trade, would no doubt do more to solidify the Empire than all the schemes of parliamentary or other union that ingenious Federationists ever devised."

—The Yorkshire Daily Post says: "It ought certainly to be easy for Great Britain and her Colonies to form a Commercial Union among themselves, which would render us all practically independent of the world. With India for cotton and corn, Australia and New Zealand and the Cape for meat and wool, while in those markets our manufacturers had no rival to fear, we might easily dispense with America. It would be a grand scheme of Imperial Federation, based on the most reliable of foundations—a common interest—and if the McKinley bill should tend to make this an accomplished fact, we at all events need have no reason to complain of its provisions."

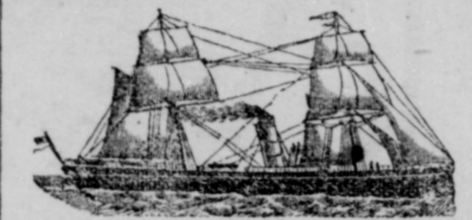

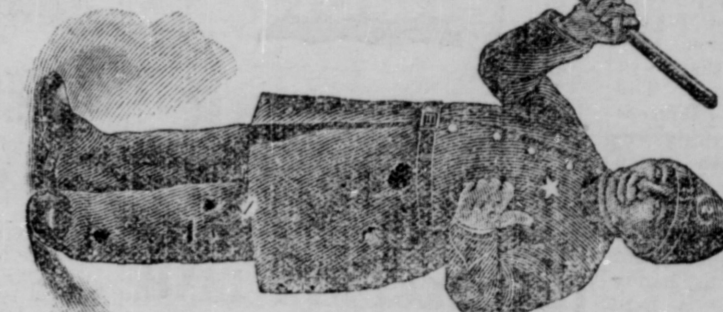
