

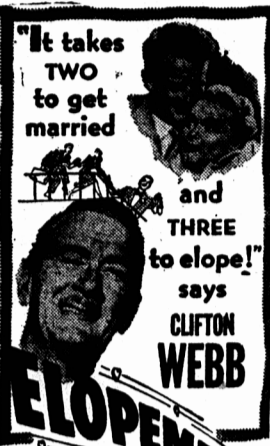

Bedeque United Church Charge Annual Meeting

The annual congregational meetings of Albany, Bedeque, and Borden United Churches were held recently, and the Official Board of the pastoral charge comprising these three congregations met the evening of January 22nd in the vestry of the Bedeque United Church to hear reports on the year's work and to plan for the future.

In all departments of the Church's work reports indicated a year of advance. Fifty-four new members were added to the Roll, forty-four by profession of faith in Jesus Christ and ten by certificate; twenty-two children were admitted to the Church by the Sacrament of Baptism. This is the largest increase for any year on record. The Sunday School at Borden reported a marked increase in membership and attendance with eight teachers, 86 pupils, and an average attendance of 76; in addition there are 24 members on the Nursery Roll. The Sunday School at Bedeque uses a truck and automobiles to bring in children from the outlying areas of the congregation. Two Church Vacation Schools were held during the summer with the Albany School reporting an enrolment of 41 as compared with 21 the previous year. The mid-week Christian Education groups—Explorers, Trail Rangers, Canadian Girls in Training, and the Prayer Meeting—continued on a high level.

The amounts of money contributed for local purposes in all three congregations were substantially higher than in 1951. In Borden the debt incurred while building the new church in 1950 was reduced by \$1000.00 and expectation is that this debt will be paid off in five or six years instead of the 10 year originally contemplated. The pastoral charge completed its Mount Allison Campaign allocation of \$1500 which had been initiated three years ago, contributing \$460.00 to the United Church Training School Building Fund, and \$2648.00 to the Missionary and Maintenance Fund. The W. M. S. organizations of the charge raised a total of \$1087.00.

The Official Board had previously adopted the new salary scale for ministers for 1953, and at the meeting of January 22nd it accepted an objective for 1953 of \$500.00 for United Church Extension; this is in addition to \$2200 raised for this purpose in 1950-51. The Board also adopted the United Church Observer Every Family Plan by which every active resident family will be enrolled as subscribers to the church paper. Plans were initiated to install an improved heating system in the parsonage. It was reported to the Board that the Bedeque congregation is planning a major addition to their church building in the immediate future. Motions of appreciation and confidence in the minister, the Rev. W. Burton Crowe, Mrs. Crowe, congregational secretaries, recording steward and treasurers, and other church officers were passed unanimously. Rev. J. M. Baxter, Messrs. Horace Wright, Major Lowther, Maurice Lodge, and Mrs. Harold Coggin were added to the Session. Other members of the Session, Boards of Stewards and Trustees were re-elected.

SPRINGFIELD W. M. S.

The regular monthly meeting of the Springfield West Baptist W. M. S. was held at the home of Mrs. Robert England on Tuesday afternoon, January 6. The meeting opened with reading of Psalms 24 and 72 in unison. Roll call was answered with a verse of scripture. In the absence of the secretary, the minutes were given by Mrs. England.

A letter from a missionary in India was read by Mrs. Nell Boulter. The treasurer gave a good report of money raised during the half year. A circle of prayer, followed, giving thanks to God for blessings during the past year, and asking for help and guidance during the new year which is ahead.

A number of readings were given on Christmas in other lands; Israel, by Mrs. Ralph Cain; Mexico, by Mrs. Howlett; Columbia, by Mrs. Leslie MacLean; Brazil, by Mrs. England; and Japan, by Mrs. Boulter.

Plans were made for a reading course, including the book, "Dawn Over Bolivian Hills," written by the late Rev. Dobbs.

Greetings were sent to Mrs. Linnie Ellis who is a member of the society, hoping she will soon be able to meet with them again.

The Meeting closed with the hymn, "My Faith Looks Up To Thee," and the Mizpah Benediction.

A delicious lunch was served by the hostess and her daughter. The next meeting is to be held at the home of Mrs. Ralph Cain. —AZ
