

Clearing On Rustling Charges Continued

Following the testimony of five Crown witnesses, the case of Charles William MacQuarrie, youth pastor at St. John's, possession of a stolen grade Shorthorn heifer, property of Irving Laird, New Brunswick, was adjourned until 9:30 a.m. Wednesday, Sept. 11.

The preliminary hearing was continued last evening in Queens County magistrate's court before Magistrate James B. Griffin in the courtroom at the County Courthouse. The prosecution is being conducted by Alan K. Scates Esq. of the defence counsel is John P. Nicholson.

The first witness, Graham Chappell, Grand, stated he had purchased a Shorthorn heifer from William MacQuarrie on July 3 and on the evening of the same day had resold it to Donald Lamont, French River.

"Wilbur Lamont, French River, son of Donald, said that he had seen the animal and had bought on July 3 in his father's pasture. Later, on July 31 he said he had shown the animal to the RCMP.

FOUND ANIMAL MISSING

Irving Laird, owner of the stolen animal, stated that on July 1, he and his son Grant moved 15 head of cattle to a pasture bordering the North Westline Road. Returning to the pasture on July 8, he said that he noticed that one was missing, and he subsequently gave a description of it to the police.

He further testified that on July 8 in company with the 28-year-old son of the farm of Donald Lamont, where he recently identified the animal as his own.

He said that the identification was made by the markings on the animal along with a knife-cut on the right ear. He stated that he and his son placed the knife-cuts on the right ear of all 15 cattle before putting them out to pasture in the latter part of May.

STAPLES REMOVED

Grant Laird, in his evidence, corroborated that given by his father, and further stated that on July 4 he had noticed staples pulled from several fence posts along the road side of the home pasture.

Cst. James Brooks, RCMP Charlottetown, stated that he and Cst. E. J. Elliott while investigating reports of missing cattle were given a description of the heifer by Laird and later

SOURIS - School registration in the Souris area is approximately 28 students higher than last year although there was a slight decrease in some individual schools.

The total enrollment of Souris Regional High School, 50 or a percentage higher than last year, is 676 which is an increase over last year's 638.

The Queens County and Prince Edward Island championship plowing matches will be staged on the farm of Ira Lewis, York on Friday and Saturday, Sept. 20 and 21. It was learned last evening from Harold P. South, MLA, Pownal who has been secretary-treasurer of the Queens County Plowing Match Association since it was organized 14 years ago.

The two championship events will be staged by the County Association of which B. (Bud) Jones, Banbury is president, and the Prince Edward Island Junior Farmers Association. The Junior Farmers will also stage talent contests for members of their own organization.

This is the first time that the provincial championship match is being held in Queens and it is expected that it will consist of competitions in both stubble and sod, with the total score to count, though this part of the competition is under the direction of the P.E.I. Plowing Council of which Thorin Fries, O'Leary RR is the president.

The Queens' championship event will be held on Friday match. It will be held on Friday with the top winners eligible to compete in the provincial Championship event next year.

Imperial Oil is sponsoring the P.E.I. championship class as visitors.

There will be a visitors class this year which replaces the MIA's event which failed to draw more than three entries a year. There will also be an open stubble plowing match on the second day.

Livestock Director L. W. Roper, a former judge at the county competition is awarding a prize to the highest point winner 20 years and under.

There will be a class for 3 or 4 sod plows or plows of more than three furrows.

The Robertson Memorial Trophy, in memory of Elliot Robertson, the first president of the county association, will go to the winner of the class for beginners.
