

Changes In Immigration Act Likely When House Resumes

OTTAWA (CP) — Legislative measures to end large-scale evasion of normal immigration procedures are expected after the Commons resumes sitting Tuesday.

They may include limits on the discretionary powers of the Immigration minister and increased authority for the Immigration Appeal Board, which rules on disputed cases.

The object is to stop the flow of would-be immigrants who have been using relaxed visa requirements to enter the country as visitors since early 1964. Once in, they stay.

There are an estimated 20,000 aliens who have entered Canada in this way now living and working in the Toronto-Hamilton area. They have no legal status. About 13,000 have applied for permits as landed immigrants but the law makes no provision for such an inundation of backdoor immigration, officials say.

"We have to clarify this situation," Immigration Minister Marchand said in a television interview March 21. "That doesn't mean we are going to deport the 20,000."

"Far from that, I think we are going to do our best to keep them here, but it has to be straightened out."

deported ones their three months was up, but the department has been buffeted by the numbers who have turned up.

NEED VISAS

They can't acquire landed immigrant status under the law because they need a visa, obtainable only in their native country.

However, the department has been accepting applications pending development of a policy.

Toronto lawyer Joseph Sedgwick recognized the problem in a recent report to the government on immigration.

He noted that thousands have entered ostensibly as visitors, then simply remain here surreptitiously while others succeed in bringing sufficient pressure to bear, political and otherwise, to gain admission as permanent residents.

Mr. Sedgwick said the practice had become so common—notably from Greece, Portugal and Italy—that immigration from some countries through normal channels is on the verge of chaos.

He recommended that the Immigration Appeal Board be made a court of record to deal with such cases, with provision for appeal to high courts.

At present, the Immigration minister may overrule the appeal board and this is where political pressure has come in. Ethnic groups exert pressure on MPs, who in turn straggle the minister.

"If the board's decision is unfavorable, recourse to the minister is almost automatic," Mr. Sedgwick noted.

Mr. Marchand has said he favors a strong appeal board to end pressure on the minister. An immigration minister had no time to study each case seriously and decide it on its merits.

WANT PRACTICE ENDED

If it isn't, concerned officials say more immigrants may be encouraged to enter by the back-door method than through normal channels.

Officials say 99 per cent of the 20,000 who are here now are deportable and many would never have got into Canada through normal channels.

The influx makes nonsense of Canada's policy of selective immigration, one top-ranking official says. It opens a route for a small selection of criminals or subversive elements to enter Canada, he adds.

Normally, these types are weeded out when interviewed in their home country. The background, health, education and skills of landed immigrants are thoroughly checked before they ever get to Canada.

No such checks are made of visitors.

They haven't needed visas since 1964, when an easily-had visitor's permit was substituted in an effort to foster the tourist trade and freer travel.

The government doesn't want to do anything to discourage tourist traffic to the Montreal world fair in 1967 and the centennial celebrations next year. Visitors normally would be

Salazar Warns Of War Danger

LISBON (Reuters)—Portuguese Premier Salazar has warned in a speech here that "another false step in connection with the settlement of the Rhodesian problem by the responsible powers could kindle a vast fire."

Salazar was speaking in the National Assembly building during a ceremony of homage to himself by representatives of the people of Portuguese Angola in West Africa.

Salazar said: "It is not too late for the case of Rhodesia's independence to be solved with London's agreement. Everything can still be saved but everything can also be lost if passions rise higher than reason."

Salazar said the way in which the case of Rhodesia's independence was handled "covered the skies of Africa with the blackest clouds."

The question was considered an exclusive internal problem for Britain from the beginning, Salazar said, but by Britain's own initiative it has been internationalized with United Nations Security Council intervention.

He said this intervention still is being carefully studied by the Portuguese government.

Salazar warned: "One more false step in the settlement of the Rhodesian problem by the responsible powers can kindle a vast fire—with risks for all who believe that they can remain immune because they are far from the flames."
