TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.
OUR NEW GOVERNOR-GENERAL

Lord Stanley of Preston Takes the Oath of Office. He Makes a Good Impression.

OTTAWA, June 11. Lord Stanley of Preston has already become the subject of talk by his democratic action. This afternoon he further demonstrated that he is a man for the people. He was on Parliament Hill long before the guard of honor and employed his time in walking up and down the boulevard chatting with Sir A. P. Caron and Gen. Middleton. After the guard arrived His Excellency did something which no other Governor before him has done. He inspected the guard. Lord Stanley was sworn in as Governor-General by Chief Justice Ritchie in the Senate Chamber this evening. There was a small gathering to witness the ceremony. Lord Stanley was escorted from Rideau Hall by a troop of dragoons and was received by a guard of honor formed of two companies of the Governor-General's foot guards. A salute of 19 guns was fired from Nepean Point Battery. Lord Stanley has subscribed \$150 for the benefit of the sufferers by the Hull fire. Lord Stanley leaves to-morrow for the Lower St. Lawrence. He will receive an address of welcome at Montreal and Quebec en route.

BRITISH PARLIAMENT, England's Defences Discussed.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION PROMISED.

LONDON, June 11. In the House of Commons to-day, Lord George Hamilton, First Lord of the Admiralty, said the statement made in regard to the number of transports necessary for 100,000 men to land in England and seize London by surprise, took into consideration only the condition that such a feat was possible; that a whole army could disembark simultaneously, and when landed, that it would be capable of rapid movement. The estimate that ships of a gross tonnage of 480,000 tons would be required for transporting the military force, he said, was on the assumption that it would be equal to three army corps comprising cavalry and artillery. Childers asked, seeing the subject was exciting attention, that a detailed authoritative statement be presented to Parliament. Hamilton replied that data had been obtained 13 years ago as a result of a joint conference. He promised to produce those of the transport department which satisfied that the tonnage referred to did not over-estimate the preparations necessary for the landing of such a force. Such an invading force from the continent, he continued, implied the distribution of the invaders in parts a hundred miles apart, with a successful voyage not less than a week instead of a few hours, and made without opposition from a hostile fleet.

THE YANKEE PIRATES Do Further Damage.

HALIFAX, June 11. Besides the forty nets destroyed by Yankee desperadoes, belonging to the fishermen at Little Ance, Petit de Grat and Rocky Bay, sixty nets belonging to fishermen at L'Ardoise were also destroyed. During Thursday and Friday a fleet of fifty Americans were cruising and seining mackerel among the nets of Canadian fishermen inshore at Richmond County, and the total damage wantonly inflicted by the Americans has not yet been fully ascertained. The names of two of the most daring of these pirates are the steamer Novely, of Portland, and the schooner Alice C. Gordon, of Gloucester.

Ottawa News Notes.

OTTAWA, June 11. The appointment of Mr. McLellan as Lieutenant-Governor of Nova Scotia is officially announced. The Government have granted permission to erect a monument to Ottawa sharpshooters in Mayor's Park. Mr. Dewdney is expected here this week to be sworn in as Minister of the Interior. Over 120 families are provided for daily in Hull.

A Copyright Association.

TORONTO, June 11. The Copyright Association of Canada was formally organized here to-night, the object being to secure such Canadian legislation as shall best serve all interests in connection with the book printing and publishing trade of Canada. John McMillan was appointed Vice-President for New Brunswick, W. McKinlay for Nova Scotia, and Theo. L. Chappelle for P. E. Island.

Excommunication Threatened.

DUBLIN, June 11. Bishop O'Dwyer hints that he will excommunicate all schismatical parishioners of his diocese who disobey the rescript. He says he has always been a nationalist, but he does not accept disobedience of the Pope as a test of fealty to the cause.

Track Laying Proceeding.

WINNIPEG, June 11. Track laying on the Red River Railroad will be begun Monday and proceed at the rate of a mile and a half a day.
