Routine Business At S'ide Town Council Meeting

Only routine business was transacted at the regular monthly meeting of the Summerside Town Council last evening. His Worship Mayor Henry Wedge presided and all the members of the Council were present.

The Clerk, speaking on behalf of the Water and Sewage Commission, said that the Commission would like authority to build a new well if, after investigation, it is deemed to be necessary. Councillor J. L. Gorriell suggested that a special meeting could be called to authorize the move after the Water and Sewage Commission had completed their investigation.

Mayor Wedge agreed and said that it should be built if the Board of Fire Underwriters considers it necessary. Also, he said that at the present time it might be a matter of defence.

The Clerk reported that the collection of both property and poll taxes is higher than it was this time last year. On motion of Councillor Driscoll the salary of Mr. Jack Peters, street foreman, was set at \$350.00.

As the result of a letter which was read from Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, local member of Parliament, a resolution was passed, on motion of Councillor G. B. Sheen, seconded by Councillor Gorriell, that formal application be made to the Department of National Defence for the purchase of the rifle range property.

Councillor Driscoll said that the work of paving certain streets under contract is proceeding satisfactorily. Pleasant and Green Streets have been completed and Arcona Street is about finished. Work is starting today on Duke Street. He said that clay will be put on top of the rock on Harvard Street this week, completing this work.

Councillor T. D. Morrison said that work on the installation of the new unit at the electric light plant is proceeding slowly but surely. It should be in operation in about a month. He also reported that the latest higher than at this time last summer.

Councillor Morrison complimented Councillor Driscoll on the new streets built by the Street Department. It is better to get the streets laid off and the water and sewage laid before they are built up. He thought the streets on the outskirts of the Town should be opened up soon as the Town is increasing.
