

UPTON PARK RACES.

The first instalment of the September meeting at Upton Park took place yesterday. The day was clear and pleasant, the track in excellent condition, and the entries of a competitive kind. There were over 600 people on the ground, with a large sprinkling of ladies. The judges were Dr. S. W. Dodd, C. C. Gardiner, Reuben Tuplin and James Currie, Esquires. A serious accident occurred at the conclusion of the bridle race, in which a boy named Abel Dower was run over, and the horse and man nearly thrown to the ground. When picked up he, however, revived. He was attended by several physicians on the ground. The races for the day were for the three minute class, one running and one bridle race. At two o'clock the race called was the three minute class, for which the following horses were entered:

The above entries, with the exception of Deceiver and Belle Robins, appeared on the track. The positions were drawn and Rapid Roan took the pole, Nellie second, Belle third, Island Maid fourth, Saucy Dan fifth and Jennie sixth.

First Heat.—At the start Belle took the lead and was first at the quarter pole, followed by Island Maid, Rapid Roan, Nellie, Jennie and Saucy Dan in rotation. Belle continually spurred along, and was followed at a good distance by Island Maid. On nearing the half-mile, all with the exception of Jennie, were for some moments on a full gallop, causing them to closely quarter Belle at the time of passing the pole. Island Maid passed second, followed in position by Nellie, Saucy Dan, Rapid Roan and Jennie. This position was held until the finish.

Second Heat.—The horses came up in good shape, and got the word "go" at the third effort, with Island Maid getting a little the best of it. All were well up except Saucy Dan. Nellie, Rapid Roan and Belle raced hotly for the second position at the quarter-mile pole; Island Maid having the first, the second was taken by Jennie with Nellie, Belle, Saucy Dan and Rapid Roan in sequence. The race, after passing the quarter pole, became exciting. Jennie collared the Maid and gave her the go-by in good style, followed by Belle—both Maid and Belle going off their feet—were passed by Jennie and Nellie. Belle and Maid quickly came down to the square work, with Belle a length in advance; she passing the half-mile post after Nellie, followed by Dan—Maid and Roan in the rear. On nearing the three-quarter pole, Belle kept constantly gaining, and at the pole gave Nellie the go-by but went in the air along with Dan and Roan. The Maid then began in earnest, and at the three-quarter pole led the way from Jennie and Nellie, but unfortunately went off her feet and was again passed by Jennie. On the home stretch Belle laid down to her work, gave Nellie and the Maid the go-by in fine style, and closely pressed Jennie on passing the wire. The Maid and Nellie following neck and neck, Dan and Roan being in the rear.

Third Heat.—Rapid Roan being badly out in the second heat, was withdrawn. At the start Belle, Jennie and Island Maid sprang off abreast, and kept in a bundle to turn. Here Belle led the way, pressed by Jennie and Saucy Dan, Nellie in the rear. This position was held the full course to the finish. The trotting in this heat was particularly good, Saucy Dan being the only one that went off his feet.

Fourth Heat.—This heat was similar to the third. At the time Bill led the way, he was followed by Jennie, Maid, Dan and Nellie. This position was maintained to the finish.

RUNNING RACE.

First Heat.—At the start Island Girl took the lead and was pressed by Jeff, at a very lively gait. Frank, Gladstone and Pete followed in a bundle at a distance. Island Girl maintained the lead at the half mile pole, with Jeff in close quarters. At the finish Island Girl came in some thirty yards ahead, followed by Jeff, Frank, Pete and Gladstone having been distanced.

In the second heat the Island Girl again took the lead and held it the whole course, coming in a full quarter of a mile ahead of Jeff, he having bolted off the track.

BRIDLE RACE.

There were five entries for this race. But owing to the accident that happened on the track, only one heat could be run, and the prize was given to Mitchell's brown horse, which took the first heat.

WAR NEWS.

LONDON, Sept. 22.

It is announced that four large London firms have been invited to make tenders for the supply of iron huts to be erected near Bucharest for one hundred thousand Russian soldiers.

The Porte sent three thousand irregular troops into Thessaly where they are sacking the country and outraging the inhabitants. Circassians have also been sent into Macedonia in violation of repeated promises.

LONDON, Sept. 23.

No official intelligence has yet been received from either side concerning the reported battle at Biela on Friday.

Gen. Ignatieff is suffering from a fever. He passed through Bucharest on Friday night to rejoin his family at Kieff, where he will remain until recalled by the Emperor.

A special from Bucharest on Saturday says: "There has been severe and indecisive fighting for two days between the Czarowitch and Mehemet Ali. The Russians still hold Biela."

Further intelligence concerning Mehemet Ali's victory on Friday states that he attacked the Russian position beyond Banya Lom. The Russians were entrenched in a village along the river.

LONDON, Sept. 23.

Nothing has been received from Biela contradictory or confirmatory of the reports of the battle there.

A Russian official bulletin dated Gorney Studen, on Saturday says: "The Turks renewed the bombardment of our Shipka Pass positions on Friday from 14 mortars. At one o'clock in the afternoon they began an assault on our right flank, but were repulsed. The fighting lasted until night. It is thought the attack will be renewed on Saturday."

CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 23.

Mehemet Ali telegraphs to-day to the Porte: "The weather prevented operations until noon on September 21st, when a furious engagement took place. We advanced to the enemy's entrenchments. Darkness stopped the fighting. The enemy's losses were twice as great as ours."

LONDON, Sept. 23.

A telegram from Bucharest says persons arriving from the headquarters of the Czarowitch at Delme Monastir think the Turks will not renew the attack of Friday, but will endeavor to cut a route to Tirnova.

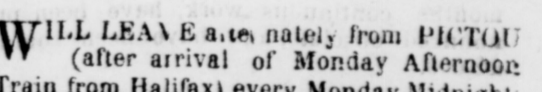
