

Local and Other Items.

FOR PICTOU.—The St. Lawrence left this port for Pictou at six o'clock this morning, and will return this evening.

A NEW INDUSTRY.—An exchange reports that Wilmot, N. S., has a creset factory, started by a young man from the States.

VALUABLE PURCHASE.—The entire horse Rollo, bred at St. Dunstan's College, was sold by auction at the market to-day, by Mr. A. McNeill. Mr. John J. Trainor was the purchaser, paying \$300 for the horse.

INTERESTING STATISTICS.—The duration of the sessions of the House of Assembly of this Province from 1875 to 1889, inclusive, was 599 days. The average session was 37 1/2 days. The shortest session was 13 days and the longest 53 days. Two sessions were held in 1879.

A PAPOOSE OF WESTERN PARENTS.—In the notice of births in the last issue of the Chronicle, of Kentville, N. S., is one of a daughter of Dr. Lone Cloud and wife. This, the Doctor says, is the first "girl papoose" of western ancestry born in the province.

FOR NEWFOUNDLAND.—The remarkably fat and handsome thoroughbred shorthorn bull, rising four years old, shown by Messrs. Blake Bros., on Market Square, to-day, attracted a good deal of attention. His weight is 2,270 lbs., and he was fed by the owners expressly for exportation to Newfoundland.

APPLE SHIPMENTS.—We learn from an exchange that the Furness line steamer Clunia, which cleared at Halifax for London recently took 8,236 barrels of apples. This will be about the last shipment of the season. Since last October over 80,000 barrels of the fruit have been shipped from Halifax to London, and about 20,000 barrels have gone from Annapolis to the English market.

SCUMBED TO THE SMOKE.—The fire in Sanger & Rockwells and the wood-working establishment, at Milwaukes, Wis., on the night of the 11th, developed a dense smoke, to which two-thirds of the fire department succumbed. Out of 150 men, not even 30 would have been available if another fire had occurred the next night. Forty had to be sent home and five are in the hospital, but all are expected to recover.

POLICE COURT.—This morning, John Rice was fined \$4 or 20 days for drunkenness, and William Murphy was given one month's imprisonment for assaulting Policeman Campbell while in the discharge of his duty. In sentencing Murphy, His Honor referred to the seriousness of his offense, and said that nothing but his youth saved him from a much longer term of imprisonment. It is hoped that his punishment will deter others from imitating his example.

EASTER BEEF.—We understand that Messrs. Pope Bros., of Pictou, have purchased Blake Bros' fat cow, shown on the Market Square, to-day, and will have her killed for their Easter market. The price paid was \$150—a handsome figure for a handsome animal. The Messrs. Pope deserve every credit for their enterprise in coming here to make a selection. We certainly must congratulate them on their good taste in purchasing the handsomest and fattest animal ever shown on the Island.

AN ILL-FATED FAMILY.—Says a Montreal despatch: Last evening at Hochelaga station a man named Thomas Wright, aged 45, was run over by a locomotive and his ankle crushed so badly that the limb had to be amputated, and the sufferer now lies unconscious at Notre Dame Hospital. A wonderful series of accidents have fallen to the family of which the injured man is the head. His grown-up son and daughter both use artificial legs, and last year two little girls were buried beneath a cartload of coal which was standing in the yard, and both died instantly. The poor father's death is expected hourly.

CRUIKSHANKS' BOTTLE.—We were present at the exhibition of Cruikshanks' Bottle last evening, and must congratulate our young friend, Mr. Harris, on the excellent manner in which the panorama was presented, and upon his rendition of the touching story of the Larimer family. The License Act.

HALIFAX, April 15.

The Supreme Court to-day, by a decision of a majority of the Judges, declared the wholesale license clause of provincial law ultra vires of the Local Legislature. This was a test case prepared and argued by direction of the Government.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

Debates and Proceedings.

OTTAWA, April 15.

The House spent the afternoon in dealing with odds and ends, such as amendments made by the Senate, etc.

The Lowery divorce bill was agreed to after a sharp discussion, by a vote of 69 to 55.

Sir John Thompson led the opposition to the bill, on the ground that the act of adultery was not sufficiently proved.

Messrs. Cartwright, Laurier and others objected to the introduction of two small bills during, as they were pleased to term it, the last week of the session.

The Minister of Justice, in reply, said the House would not rise before the end of next week.

Two and a half hours were wasted by the Opposition after recess in a vain endeavor to burk the bill authorizing the granting of pensions to Northwest mounted policemen.

Mr. Jones, of Halifax, moved an amendment to the effect that instead of pensioning those men the Government retain a percentage of their pay to form a superannuation allowance as now obtained in the civil service.

He denounced the pension system as vicious in principle and bitterly attacked the measure as the entering wedge for pensions to military school corps, etc.

Mr. Jones' cry was echoed by Messrs. Davies, Mills, McDonald, McDonald, (of Huron,) McMullen and others.

Sir John, Mr. Davin, and Gen. Laurier defended the force and pointed out the necessity of the bill as a means of inducing trained men to remain for years in the service. The amendment was rejected—106 to 66—and the bill agreed to.

When the Franchise Bill came up for third reading at 11 o'clock, Mr. Charlton moved an obstructive amendment of universal suffrage tendency.

Mr. Charlton's amendment was killed, 88 to 59.

Mr. Davies, seconded by Mr. Welsh, then moved an amendment applying to Prince Edward Island only.

Mr. Davies' amendment was rejected after midnight by 55 to 88.

Mr. Watson then moved that the preliminary lists for this year be made up from existing assessment lists and records, and from declarations based on personal knowledge. This was lost without division, and the bill was then read a third time and passed.

The Government bill to amend the Post Office Act was then read a third time and adopted.

The Governor General will come down at 4 o'clock to-morrow to assist to a large batch of bills.

Hon. Mr. Foster gave notice of the following resolution for Wednesday: First, to provide that the Governor-in-Council may give a subsidy not exceeding \$25,000

stg. to assist in establishing an effective fortnightly service between British Columbia, the Australian colonies and New Zealand. Second, to provide that the Governor-in-Council may enter into a contract for a term not exceeding ten years from any company for the performance of the fast weekly mail steamship service between Canada and the United Kingdom, making connection with a French port, for the carriage of mails, and the subsidy not to exceed \$50,000 a year. Third, to provide that a subsidy may be given not exceeding \$15,000 sterling per annum, for a monthly steamship service, or a subsidy not exceeding \$2,500 sterling per annum, fortnightly, between British Columbia, China and Japan, such subsidy to be given for such terms of years as may be considered expedient, provided always that during such term the Government of Great Britain and Ireland gives to such company a subsidy of not less than \$45,000 sterling per annum for the monthly service, or of not less than \$75,000 sterling per annum for the fortnightly service.

Gabriel Dumont at Home.

WINNIPEG, April 15.

A special from Duck Lake, N. W. T., says that Gabriel Dumont arrived home on Friday last. Riel's lieutenant at once held a meeting at Batouche, but only twenty-five were present. Amongst other things, Dumont said he visited Ottawa, but did not call on Sir John Macdonald; he did not think it his duty. Sir John should have called on him. Amnesty had now been granted the rebels by the Dominion Government, and that amnesty meant that all rebels should get their cattle and every other thing lost and confiscated. He wanted a strong committee formed and a petition sent to the Lieut.-Governor at Regina for his signature and approval, and then sent to Ottawa. If Mr. Royal refused to sign it, then he, as a deputation, would go to Ottawa himself. "We must have our claims paid," said Dumont. "The rebels were not to blame for the trouble; they were led into it, and now they must be paid." A committee of forty men was then formed with instructions to lose no time in getting the petition prepared and sent to Regina. As a number of Indians were present, Dumont addressed them in Cree.

The Sullivan-Kilrain Fight.

NEW YORK, April 15.

Representatives of John L. Sullivan and Jake Kilrain met to-day at the Clippier office and made their deposit for the great fight. After considerable wrangling, Allen H. Cridge was selected final stake holder. The fight is to take place at New Orleans, on July 8th.

Navigation Open.

MONTREAL, April 15.

Navigation is fully opened and vessels are entering the harbor from lake ports. Forwarders are extremely anxious to have the St. Lawrence canals opened at once.
