Pavement From Ch'town To Tignish

For the first time in the history of the Province it is now possible to travel all the way from Charlottetown to Tignish on pavement. Mr. Gordon White, Deputy Minister of Public Works and Highways, said yesterday that the final link had been completed this week.

Formerly the pavement extended to Montrose and the new section of light pavement was laid from Montrose to Tignish on the Western Road on the route through Alberton. This new section was an important, though short, part of the Provincial Government's road building program for this year.

Mr. White said the overall building program was proceeding satisfactorily.

Group of Italian Immigrants Arrive

MONTREAL (CP)—A gay group of airborne immigrants arrived here Thursday first of 800 chosen by the Italian Catholic trade union organization.

There were 74 young men and one girl, Lydia Marchetti, in the walking group that arrived by air. Their jobs will take them to various parts of Canada as cabinet-makers, machinists, construction workers and agriculturists.

OFFSHORE INCIDENT—Minor excitement in the harbor yesterday was caused when a young girl, a resident of York Point, was in a small boat at the shore near her home. The strong wind blowing at the time blew the dinghy offshore and into the North River. A resident of York Point telephoned the girl's predicament to City Police here. The boat owned by the Fire Department went out but it was believed that a motorboat would have a better chance of reaching her in time. As a result, Joey Macdonald and his two sons went in their speedboat. However, the strong wind had swept the dinghy right across the North River and beached it on the Inkerman Shore with the girl still safe.

Irish Nationalists Clash With Police

POMEROY, Northern Ireland. (CP)—Irish nationalists clashed with police Thursday night during a big demonstration for their anti-British hero who was coming home from jail. At least 12 policemen and 40 demonstrators were injured, Reuters reported.

Bonfires blazed from the surrounding mountains to welcome Liam Kelly, 32, a nationalist who has the distinction of holding seats in both the Northern Ireland and Irish republic parliaments at the same time.

Kelly, who manages a co-operative store in this little village in County Tyrone, was elected to the Northern Ireland parliament in the October general election. As an abstentionist he never took his seat since the abstentionists use a boycott of the parliament to express their pro-unionist views.

He had just been released from a Belfast jail after serving a year for making seditious remarks about the Queen while he was running for office in the Northern Ireland government.

Eisenhower Proposes Millions Pray For Peace

EVANSTON, Ill. (AP)—President Eisenhower proposed Thursday that "hundreds upon hundreds of millions" of people throughout the world join in prayer in "an unending campaign for peace."

In a speech prepared for the general assembly of the World Council of Churches at Northwestern University, the president said "the cause of peace needs God," and added:

"I believe that you, spiritual leaders of a great world organization, together with your brethren of other faiths, can lead the way. The goal should be nothing short of inviting every single person in every single country in the world who believes in the power of prayer to a supreme being, to join in a mighty, simultaneous, intense act of faith."

SEES WONDROUS RESULTS "That act of faith might take the form of a personal prayer, by hundreds upon hundreds of millions, delivered simultaneously and fervently for the devotion, wisdom and stamina to work unceasingly for a just and lasting peace. If this mass dedication launched an unending campaign for peace, supported constantly by prayer, I am certain wondrous results would obtain."

The President flew here from Springfield, Ill., where he took part in a Republican day celebration at the Illinois state fair.

Northwestern University presented an honorary doctor of laws degree to Eisenhower after his address.

U.S. IDEALS

The President said the United States, as a people, has put its ideals into the records. "We have chosen to state these ideals for all the world to see."

Since the beginnings of the United States as a nation, he said, we have announced "what we intended to make out of this country."

"We proclaimed then the principles on which it was founded and for which we continue to strive. We have chosen to state these ideals for all the world to see. But the ideals we have set forth, that we have blazoned on the record, stand always there to challenge us. Thus, we shall view with the greatest of sympathy your own efforts here to set forth a steadily higher ideal toward which man in his growth must always move."

India Proposes Talks On Goa

NEW DELHI, (Reuters)—India Thursday proposed to Portugal that representatives of the two countries meet here next Tuesday to consider impartial observation of activities on the Goan border and "any fresh proposals" from either side.

The note, handed Thursday afternoon to the Portuguese minister here, was the latest in a series resulting from the Indian campaign to merge the Portuguese pocket possessions on the sub-continent with India.

Portugal originally proposed Aug. 8 that foreign observers be sent to the possessions as well as to adjoining territory in India where Goan "liberation" volunteers were organizing to take over the possessions.

India's reply two days later was considered unsatisfactory in Lisbon since it allegedly agreed to neutral observers within the Portuguese possessions but not in the surrounding territory. A second Indian note Aug. 14 urged the prompt appointment of representatives to discuss the issue.

ATTORNEY GENERAL COMMENDED IN DIOCESAN CONVENTION RESOLUTION

A resolution commending Hon. Walter E. Dearby, Attorney for his attitude and action towards the elimination of salacious literature from circulation and a request for a continuance was passed during the closing hours of the annual Provincial Diocesan Convention of the Catholic Women's League yesterday morning.

A further resolution deploring the nudity display on magazine covers, was also passed. Other resolutions recommended that the Provincial Catechetical Committee provide an intermediate catechism adaptable to children older than juniors and younger than the more advanced.

It was agreed to render financial assistance towards sending two girls to Grainville, Ohio, to attend a course in Catholic Action.

The Drama Festival Association was commended by resolution for their contribution to the Province in providing means whereby deeper thinking and easier expression has been developed among the young people. Sub-divisions were requested to give moral and financial support to this activity.

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Less Bread But Higher Price

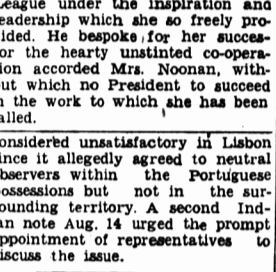
OTTAWA, (CP)—Canadian bakers are making less bread this year but are getting a higher price for it.

The bureau of statistics reported Thursday that bakeries produced 352,000,000 pounds of bread in the first three months of this year, down 1,171,000 from a similar period last year, and 4,410,000 from the first quarter of 1952.

The value rose to \$41,677,000 from \$37,740,000 in 1952. The average price per pound was
