Where Are The Cheques?

Quite understandable many potato producers are wondering why cheques in settlement of potatoes sold through the marketing Board Agency are not being distributed more promptly.

There is no denying the fact that due to the large quantity of potatoes being handled by the Agency that the Agency staff and equipment have been unable to get out the 600 odd cheques a day which would be necessary to make settlement for the 75-110 cars which have been daily handled since November 1.

When the Agency office was organized an accounting machine was installed which has a capacity in an eight hour day of approximately 300 cheques, this machine is now being eventually back settled and should be caught up and then there on cheques will go out within from two to four days after receipt of the assemblers report.

Rapid Organization.

The achievement of the Potato Board in organizing, staffing and equipping its sales office in a space of 10 days in one which is perhaps not as widely understood or appreciated as should be the case.

Very exact accounting must be carried out to satisfy Federal Government Auditors, every transaction taking must be carefully checked and exact records compiled. Three officials from Ottawa who visited the Province recently to check on the operations of the Agency were well satisfied with the manner in which the work was being done.

The Potato Board office and the Agency office have been two of the busiest places in the province this last month with the staff working long hours, meetings being held, and giving required information. A good job has been done and the potato growers of this Province can view with satisfaction the work which their Board is doing.

No Hangover.

It has come to our attention that some potato producers are of the opinion that in the event of this years potato agreement showing a deficit that the Federal Government will charge the loss up to next years crop. Nothing could be farther from the truth, agreements are made specifically for one crop year and there is no possibility of carrying a loss from one years operation over to another.

Leadership Short Courses.

The leadership short courses planned for next week and the first of December are the result of a joint effort by the Department of Education and Agriculture, the Women's Institute's Federation, Credit Unions, Co-operatives, Junior Farmers, 4-H Clubs and Film Councils.

While the Farm Forum office is doing much of the organizational work nevertheless the short courses

are the result of the united effort on the part of the above mentioned groups. The same ability which fits a person to capably lead a Farm Forum are similar to those required in a Women's Institute a Co-op or any other which might be named.

The only unpredictable factor connected with these courses is the attendance, the organizers will do their job, the rest is up to the public.

The opinion of farm people on these matters is of vital importance to all farm organizations and it is essential that the criticisms be strongly brought forth in order that organizations receive guidance from those who are most decidedly concerned — the farmers themselves.


