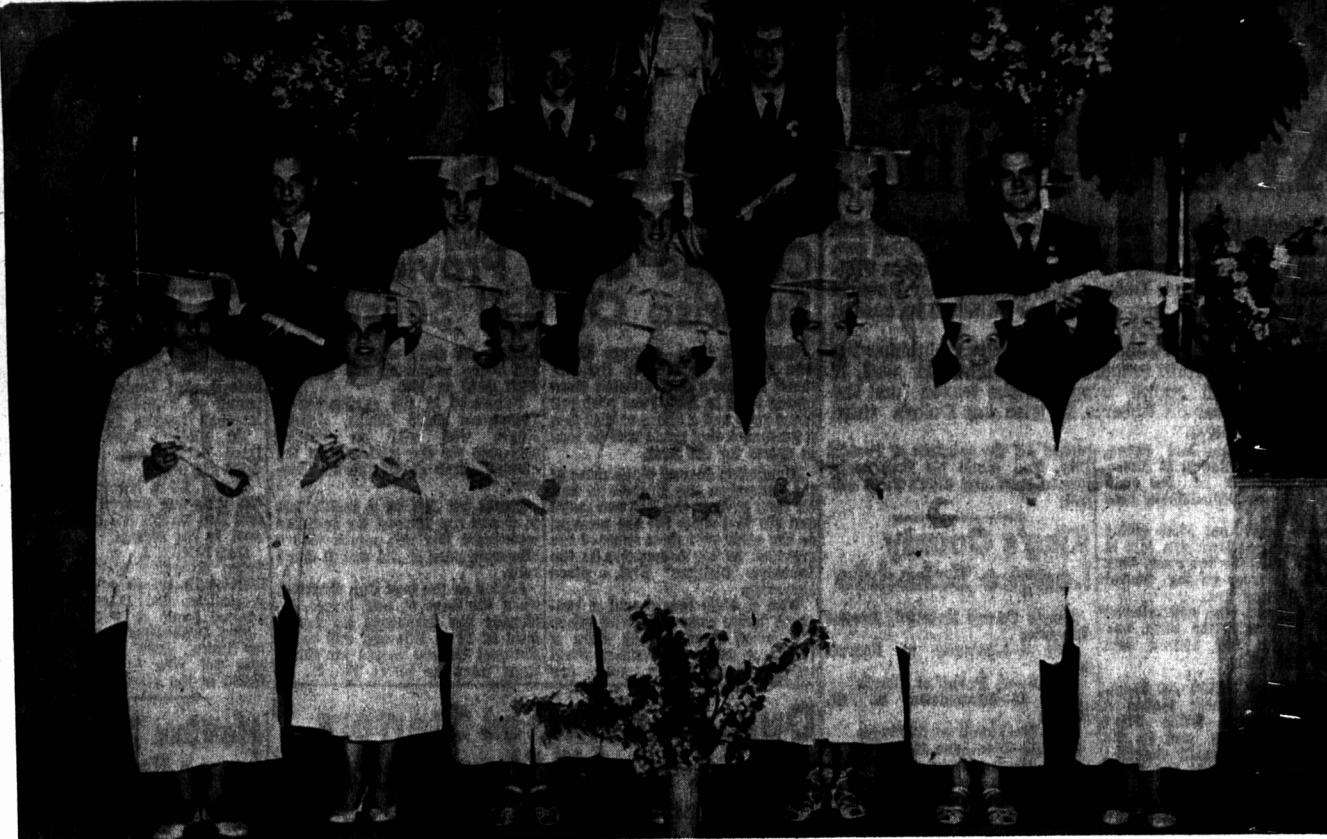

*INSPECTING CATTLE—Staying at Lane's Tourist Court, Montague, are Dr. Anthony D. Veroni, Mrs. Veroni, and family of Wolfville, N. S. Dr. Veroni, a veterinary inspector, has been sent here by the Health of Animals Branch, Department of Agriculture, Dominion Government, working in conjunction with the Provincial Government, to carry out the regular five year T. B. test on all cattle in King's County. Dr. Veroni is also carrying out an important eradication program for brucellosis or Bangs disease in cattle in the county, and later will do similar work in Queen's and Prince. The program which he is carrying out respecting Bangs disease is being done in close cooperation with the Provincial Department, and at the present time Dr. Veroni is being assisted by Dr. Bud Jones of Montague. They are presently working in the Fourth Electoral District of Kings. Dr. Veroni estimates that it will require three months to complete the work with inspectors working out of Souris and other localities.

Jaycees Plan Road-E-O For Teen-age Group

The Junior Chamber of Commerce of Canada in cooperation with the All-Canada Insurance Federation will sponsor next year the first National Teen-age Road-E-O, aimed at promoting better driving habits among young people. This was announced by Mr. John Humphrey of Toronto on behalf of the All-Canada Insurance Federation, a trade association of some 280 fire, automobile and casualty insurance companies.
The teen-age road-e-o is already well established in the United States with approximately one half million youths taking part. It is an exciting test of driving skill and safety for both boys and girls under 20 years of age.
Mr. Humphrey made the announcement while attending the Jaycee National Convention in Halifax last week to present traffic safety awards to the Chambers conducting the most outstanding safety programs during the year. Awards totalling \$2400.00 were presented to the winners of the contest by each of the four Atlantic Provinces who added their own provincial favours by sponsoring the dinner and entertainment for one day. The Prince Edward Island Jaycees provided the lobsters for a giant lobster feed held at the scenic and historic town of Lunenburg, with the cooperation and assistance of the local Jaycees. A square dance provided the entertainment for the evening.
The delegates were officially welcomed by the Hon. Henry D. Hicks, Premier of Nova Scotia, and in an interesting ceremony the Jaycee National President, Montague F. Aldous of North Vancouver was made an honorary member of the old Acadia Society of the Order of the Good Time. Mayor Leonard A. Kitz welcomed the delegates to Halifax, and received from the National President the first copy of the 1955 Jaycee Canadian Pictorial Diary. One of the outstanding events of the Convention was the election of the new officers and directors for the year 1955-56. Eight national vice presidents were elected including Lloyd Caldwell of Halifax representing the Maritime Provinces.
The 1956 National Convention will be held in Winnipeg.

U. S. Intelligence Experts Are Aghast At Optimism

Some top-rank American intelligence experts are aghast at the optimism in some Washington quarters over prospects for some kind of a deal with Russia ending the cold war.
These officials, who have been carefully following Soviet developments for years, believe it is dangerous nonsense to expect the Russians to accept the kind of terms that are necessary to ease East-West tensions.
In their view, neither the Geneva summit conference this month or later Big Four talks at a lower level will succeed in removing the threat of war from the international horizon.
PIPE DREAM THEORY
What particularly baffles these observers is the current outpouring of stories picturing Russia as so weak internally that it has no alternative but to make sweeping concessions to the West in the near future.
This theory, now being discussed seriously by responsible officials, holds that Russia's agricultural and industrial production has fallen so far behind that the Kremlin wants a two or three year truce in order to catch up with the West.
Intelligence experts believe any such theory is a pipe dream.
Russia's current sweet talk, they believe, represents a new, more imaginative manoeuvre to block what the Soviets fear most—German rearmament.
NO DEFINITE PROOF
There is no solid evidence whatever, they say, that the Russians are hurting because their industrial machine and farm output has started to collapse.
On the contrary, they feel there is good reason for believing that Russia has successfully expanded production in these fields in the past two years and that output will improve from now on with less money and effort.
Further, they obviously has succeeded in turning out new jet fighters, jet bombers and impressive amounts of new ground weapons in recent months.
With this evidence before them, these intelligence experts now are trying to curb the more enthusiastic and optimistic U. S. government officials who believe the Russians in some way may have got religion and will behave like good boys from now on.

Passing Of Mr. Joseph Ford

Wide-spread sympathy was felt throughout the South Lake district and surrounding communities when it became known that one of South Lake's most highly respected citizens, Mr. Joseph Ford, had passed away on June 29th, following an illness of two months.
Mr. Ford was of a quiet and friendly nature and an up and doing lobster fisherman. He was at all times courteous and obliging, never slighted his fellow men and when the time came for a good turn he was right at hand to do so.
Mr. Ford was sadly grieved by the death of his loving wife nee (Florence McDonald) and a few years later by his only son Ernest, who met death by drowning at Black Pond. Those close deaths left a gap that could never be filled and no doubt hastened his death.
His funeral was held at St. Columbe Church on June 11 and was very largely attended by friends and neighbors, who went to pay their last respects to a faithful friend and kind neighbor.
The funeral service was conducted by Rev. Father A. McDonald, who also conducted at the grave. Burial was in the adjoining church cemetery.
Mr. Ford leaves to mourn five daughters who will cherish the loving memory of their father; also several brothers in the U. S. A. and one sister, Mrs. Joseph Dumphy, Souris.
