DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

Mr. Charlton's Bill.

OTTAWA, March 16. Mr. Charlton's Bill to provide for the punishment of adultery, seduction and like offences has been amended. Clause third enacts that any person who is a superintendent, tutor or teacher in a private school or other public institution of learning attended by females, or who is instructor of any female in music, or any branch of learning or art, who has illicit intercourse at any time or place with any female under instruction or attending such school or institution, during the term of engagement as superintendent, tutor, instructor or teacher, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction shall be imprisoned for two years in the penitentiary.

Summerside Harbor.

Mr. Hackett's motion for improvement to Summerside Harbor was supported by Mr. Yeo. The motion passed. A number of other motion papers also passed.

Attempt to Blow Up the British Parliament.

LONDON, March 16. A gas explosion occurred in the Local Government Board offices, in Westminster, at nine o'clock yesterday morning. It is believed it was caused by dynamite in an attempt to destroy the Parliament Buildings. The galleries of the House of Commons were much shaken. The Duke of Edinburgh was present in the House at the time of the explosion.

The Phoenix Park Murder.

DUBLIN, March 16. It is alleged that Joseph Mullett, one of the prisoners indicted for the murder of Lord Cavendish and Mr. Burke, has turned approver, and has confessed that Patrick Egan, the late Treasurer of the Land League, was implicated in the conspiracy.

Gortzchakoff's Death.

BADEN-BADEN, March 16. The physicians who held a post mortem examination of the body of Gortzchakoff believe that his death was caused by poison.

The 'Varsity Race.

LONDON, March 16. The race between the Oxford and Cambridge University crews took place yesterday, and resulted in a victory for the Oxford, which came in three lengths ahead.

Missionary Meeting.

The annual missionary meeting of the congregation of Princetown, Malpeque, was held, according to long established usage, on Tuesday, the 13th inst. The Committee managing the Missionary Association met half an hour before the time for public service, for the purpose of receiving contributions to the funds, which are voluntarily tendered up to the last moment, and recommending to the congregation a basis of appropriation. At eleven a. m. Divine Service was conducted, the subject of missions being the topic. At the close of this service, the business part of the proceedings was entered upon, the Rev. Geo. McMillan taking the chair. He read a carefully prepared general report, and a summary of receipts and appropriations. The Treasurer, Mr. Peter McNutt, read a detailed statement of the contributions. After some consideration of the proposed appropriations, the recommendation of the committee was adopted, and officers-bearers chosen for the ensuing missionary year.

The amount appropriated on Missionary day, was \$291.00, viz:— Foreign Missions \$150.00 Home Missions, proper 25.00 Supplementing Fund 50.00 College Fund 41.00 B. & F. Bible Society 25.00

Previously received and appropriated, \$163.50. French Evangelization \$52.00 Assembly, Synod and Pres'y Fund 27.50 Aged and Indim Ministers Fund 10.00 Supplementary Fund Debt 19.00 Dayspring & Mission Schools 53.00 Total amount for the year \$454.50. A few more contributions are expected to come in. The total contributions of this congregation for the last two financial years were \$5,000—partly for acquisition of church equipment and payment of same, partly for current expenses, and partly for the general interests of the denomination, and the B. & F. Bible Society. Well done Malpeque! Let us thank God, and take courage.—COM.

We understand that the canvassing committee have succeeded in getting a sufficient number of cows, and F. T. Newbury, Esq., of Charlottetown, has agreed to erect a Cheese Factory at or near Ross' Corner. We are also pleased to hear that Mr. Major Schurman has the contract for the building.

A petition to the Minister of Public Works, to have Fitzroy Street opened straight through to a point opposite the residence of Thos. B. Hall, is, we understand, being circulated about town. It can be readily seen that such a street would be of great benefit to our town, as it would give farmers and others coming in from the country a chance to get by the station without having their horses frightened by the switch and other engines.

Our notice of the public temperance meeting at Centreville on the 2nd inst., under the auspices of the Summerside Alliance, was accidentally omitted last week. Frederick H. Moyses, Esq., who was chosen chairman, favored the meeting with an appropriate address, after which there were alternate speeches, songs, etc., during the evening. Several prominent members of the Alliance here were present, nearly all of whom spoke. Rev. Maggs from Margate and James Carruthers, Esq., also addressed the meeting. The programme which, by the way, was a very good one, was fully sustained throughout.
