

CURRENT NOTES.

Maine cotton mills are curtailing productions. Just as the youth is beat the twig's inclined. A mild form of cholera has appeared at St. Petersburg. A Seal's Act agitation has been begun at St. Thomas, Ont. A paper has been circulated among the lower classes at Marseilles, that the doctors with the cholera to spread in order to sweep off beings unfitted for the struggle for existence. The New York Times publishes a story concerning the Union Pacific Railway in its relations with the Government, from which it would appear that no more dividends can be paid on the road till some fifty millions due to the Government is provided for.

Says the Quebec "Chronicle": Mr. J. B. Parant, inventor of the Parant Automatic Self-coupling, and Joseph R. Michaud, Agent of the Passumpsic Railway, have just returned from the city of Boston, having completed arrangements with a Boston Company for the sale of their rights for New England States for \$50,500. We understand the parties intend forming a joint stock company for Canada.

The sewage of Toronto is carried into the bay upon which the city is situated, and the people there are becoming alive to the necessity of finding some other outlet for it. When it is taken into consideration that there are a hundred thousand people thus served, the question becomes more serious. A most unwholesome sediment of considerable and always increasing thickness is being formed on the surface of the bay, thus hopelessly polluting the water. The smell arising therefrom reaches far into the city, and the situation is daily growing worse.

The latest United States census shows that the males outnumber the females in an increasing ratio. It is natural that this should be so in regard to the foreign born population, as more men than women emigrate. Still, many are not aware that in 1880, the foreign born male in the States exceed the females by 581,189 as against 446,757 in 1870, at the close of the war which had killed off about half a million of the male population, the native born females were in excess of the males by 17,598. In 1880 the native born males preponderated to the extent of 300,668.

The lately published vital statistics for Ireland for 1883 give the population at 5,015,328, showing a falling off from 1882 of 82,525. The marriage rate, which was 15.3 per 1,000 in England and 14 in Scotland, was but 8.6 in Ireland, and 0.5 below the mean rate in the previous decade. The birth rate was 2.0 below the mean rate, and was but 23.6, while in England and Scotland it was 33.2 and 32.5. The death rate, which was 17.4 in 1882, rose to 19.2 in 1883, while in England and Scotland it was 19.5 and 20.1. It should be remembered that owing to emigration 42.1 per cent. of the deaths in Ireland last year were of persons of sixty and upward. The proportion in England was 25 per cent.

In a town in Normandy lives an aged lady named Marie Durant, much visited, who is believed to be 123 years and a few weeks old, but who, when asked, with true feminine instinct declares she does not know. For ninety-six years she has been a widow, and during her lifetime four kings have ruled, the stars of two emperors have risen and set, and three Republics have been established. She lives exclusively on vegetable diet, but is always ready for a petite verre of cognac, and says she would have died but for frequent doses of it during a recent illness. Her skin is brown and wrinkled and all the flesh seems to have disappeared from under it, though there are still small veins of color on her withered cheeks.

During a recent tornado in Richmond, Ky., a farmer's wife was in the summer kitchen preparing supper, and her daughter was in the dining-room setting the table. As the wind struck the house, the currents divided; one carried the kitchen two miles up an adjoining county, and the other deposited the main part of the house, half a mile in the opposite direction. By a strange freak of nature, both the houses were picked up by the returning current, and sent back directly in their former places as neatly as if the work had been done by hand. The women were so busily engaged in their work that they did not notice anything unusual happened until their attention had been called to a crack in the roof.—N. Y. Graphic.

The English agricultural journals have been eagerly discussing the claims of ensilage to public favor. It does not appear to have met with such vigorous advocates among scientific farmers there as on this continent. Englishmen are proverbially cautious, and any innovation in practice must have proved its *raison d'être* by the incontrovertible evidence of experience before they take to it very warmly. It goes against it in the opinion of the agricultural press that Sir John Lawes, whose authority on matters connected with farming will be generally accepted, has shown himself sceptical of its great merits. He warns its enthusiastic devotees that it will require many analyses, many experiments in feeding, and a fair test comparison with the old system, before its real value can be confidently pronounced upon. In order that such a trial may be made under proper conditions, any skilful scientific direction, the Cirencester Chamber of Commerce petitioned the Council of the Royal Agricultural Society to conduct a careful investigation and publish a report of the results. That society, however, was unwilling or unprepared to undertake the task proposed, and it has been suggested that Sir John Lawes should carry out the desired experiments himself. It is to be hoped that he will do so, and, in case he consents, the result will be awaited with much interest in the United States and Canada as well as in England.—Some persons find fault with him for cautioning farmers against ensilage before the matter had been decided, but others think he deserves the thanks of the farming community for a timely admonition which may, in many cases, prevent loss of time and means as well as the annoyance of disappointment. Of course, if on trial he finds that it merits approval, he will not hesitate to give it.

HOW TO MARK THE BALLOTS.

Be sure to mark your ballot for the Liberal Conservative Candidate

The elector, on receiving the ballot-paper, shall forthwith proceed into one of the compartments of the polling station, and there mark his ballot paper, making a cross with a pencil on any part of the ballot-paper within the division containing the name of the candidate for whom he intends to vote, and shall then fold up such ballot-paper, so that the initials on the back can be seen without opening it, and hand it to the Deputy Returning Officer, who shall, without unfolding it, ascertain, by examining the initials, and the number upon the counterfoil, that it is the same he furnished to the elector, and shall first detach and destroy the counterfoil, and shall then immediately, and in the presence of the elector, place the ballot-paper in the ballot-box.—Ballot Act, Sec. 45.

No voters should make any mark on the ballot-paper save one cross on any part of the ballot paper within the division containing the candidate's name for whom he intends to vote. If the voter writes his name or initials, or any remarks, he makes his ballot useless. A simple cross upon the ballot for your candidate will assist in electing him. Any other mark or writing will contribute to their defeat.

- 1. Poll opens at nine o'clock a. m., and closes at five o'clock p. m.
2. Vote early.
3. See that your Liberal Conservative neighbor votes early also.
4. If you have a vehicle, place it at the service of your Committee to bring tardy voters to the polls. Give the information to the Secretary of Committee.
5. Do not "pair" on polling day with your Grit neighbor. Poll your own vote and let him look out for his.
6. Poll every possible vote; the loss or gain of a single vote in each sub-division may make all the difference between victory and defeat.
7. If your returning officers and deputy returning officers are Grits watch them.
8. Each Liberal Conservative should vote as though the result of the election depended upon his individual exertions.
9. Remember that any bribery, corrupt treating, hiring of vehicles, paying of voters' expenses, or any undue influence, will not only void the election, but is punishable by law.
10. Electors can only vote at one polling sub-division in the same electoral division, no matter in how many sub-divisions they may have votes.
11. Any elector's vote may be challenged who has received anything on account of his vote, or has been promised anything directly or indirectly, either to induce him to vote at the election or for loss of time, travelling expenses, hire of teams, or any other service connected therewith; or even if the said elector has directly or indirectly paid or promised anything to any person, either to induce him to vote or to refrain from voting at the election.
12. An elector having more votes than one in the same electoral district should vote in that electoral sub-division in which he resides. Attention to this rule will facilitate the polling, and possibly contribute to the individual elector's comfort.
