

Impaired Case Fine Increased

George Louis Joseph, 39 Pownall Street, appeared before Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, in Queen's County Magistrate's Court yesterday afternoon, charged with break, entry and theft.

Margarine Sale Legalized Here?

Premier Walter Shaw has indicated that the question of legal sale of margarine in the province as long as he was minister.

P.E.I. is the only province in Canada where the sale of margarine is illegal. Government officials admit, however, that huge quantities are bought by Islanders on the mainland and brought into the province.

The P.E.I. Legislative Committee of the International Railway Brotherhoods presented a brief to the provincial cabinet Thursday asking again, as it has in past years, that the sale of margarine be permitted.

The brotherhood said it was possible many citizens could not afford the purchase of butter even at present prices, and it did not feel the sale of margarine would be detrimental to the dairy industry of the province.

The department of agriculture through the years has taken a different view and one minister

went so far as to say that margarine would not be sold in the province as long as he was minister.

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Steel Contract Increases Pay

SAULT STE. MARIE, Ont. (CP)—A new two-year working agreement between Algoma Steel Corporation and local 2251 of United Steel Workers of America (CLC) was signed Saturday, by D. A. Machum, vice-president of industrial relations at Algoma said here.

Mr. Machum said new wage rates were put into effect for the pay period starting Jan. 21. Retrospective pay at 10 cents an hour for all hours worked between Aug. 1, 1964, and Jan. 1, 1965, is being computed at present.

Certain other benefits under the agreement, including increased life insurance and welfare benefits, became effective Feb. 1.

Promotional Group For Industry Urged

The Charlottetown Board of Trade has asked the provincial government to consider setting up an industrial development promotion organization similar to Nova Scotia's Industrial Estates Limited.

A five-man delegation from the board presented a brief containing the recommendation yesterday to the cabinet. Members of the delegation were Frank Curtis, George Chandler, Walthen Gaudet, William

Brennan and William Hancock. The board representatives said following the presentation that they were well received by the cabinet. "The government gave us an excellent hearing," one member said.

The board also told the government that it is "prepared to submit to the government, if requested, the names of Prince Edward Island businessmen, whom we consider would enjoy the confidence of the people of this province if they were appointed directors of the type of organization suggested."

The board also suggested that while the provincial department of industry and natural resources was doing a commendable job in industrial development, "it was agreed that the best brains and abilities of our people were not being utilized in the promotion and development of industries, and it was suggested that the chief reason for the reluctance of those people to become involved in a project of this type was because of the political intonations."

The urgency of the research is due to the fact that, last year, 50.4 per cent of deaths in the Maritime provinces was due to heart attacks and heart disease.

All the banks of Canada are co-operating with the Heart Foundation in accepting donations. Official receipts are issued.

The treasurer of the Heart Fund in Charlottetown is E.C. Wright, manager of the Royal Bank of Canada. The president of the Heart Fund chapter in Summerside is W.A. Currie, manager of Eastern Securities. D.B. MacDougald, manager of the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce is treasurer in Summerside.

Directors of the Heart Foundation in Prince Edward Island are Dr. J.B. Downing, Summerside, and Col. L.F. Macdonald, Charlottetown. Members of the medical advisory committee in P.E.I. are Dr. J.C. Sinnott and P.E.I. Dr. Drysdale.

The campaign objective in P.E.I. is \$2,500. Last year \$2,000 was raised. All monies raised in the campaign are used in the Atlantic Provinces. In addition, grants are made by the Canadian Heart Foundation for fellowships and medical research through grants-in-aid.
