

"not guilty." Mr. Smith O'Brien's trial commences on Monday, and Mr. Meagher's on Tuesday. Mr. Mitchell cannot be tried till next term.

The foreign news is of an exciting and deeply interesting character. In France, the leader of the great Progressive movement upon the Continent is now in the hands of a duly organised deliberative assembly, essentially democratic, with a responsible Executive, including some of the ablest men of the age. The policy of that Ministry led by Lamartine, is said to be pacific, and yet when we turn to that passage of his speech on referring from the Provisional Government, 'the democratic and fraternal principle has become the real frontier of France'—it may be deemed doubtful whether the War spirit of the French will be restrained. Hostilities between the Sardinian and Austrian forces had received a new impulse by the accession of the Pope to the Italian Confederacy, whilst the friendly mediation of England has not yet prevented the continuation of the war between Holstein and Prussia against Denmark. The whole of Germany is in an agitated state. On the Polish frontiers the utter disorganization of all Government has led to the most frightful excesses. Slavery has been abolished in the Portuguese ultra-Marine possessions. In Spain, an attempt at Revolution made in the capital had proved unsuccessful—the conflict was bloody, and lasted several hours. General Tologio was amongst the killed. The Pope had declared war against Austria, thus giving way to the feelings of intense hatred entertained by his subjects against their old oppressors. At the latest advices a report was current in Paris that His Holiness had been induced to revoke the declaration, and had consequently been placed under restraint in the Castle of St. Angelo. The Journal des Debats confirms the rumour. Verily, those are strange days, and the signs of the times are portentous.

FOREIGN INTELLIGENCE.

In France the following ministry has been nominated and appointed by the Executive Commission, in which body is, for the present, lodged the Sovereign authority—the Ministry being responsible to the Assembly. The Republic has lost its terrors—persons who once regarded it as a fearful monster, now appear to be satisfied that there is nothing terrible in it. The wild anarchical ideas attributed to the Parisian populace by whom the Revolution was achieved, are proved to have had no existence—whilst that essentially democratic and truly popular Body, the National Assembly, is reported to have settled down into calm deliberation, without noise or tumult.

**THE FRENCH MINISTRY.**—Paris, Thursday 6 p.m.—The Executive Commission has appointed the Ministry as follows—Bastide, Foreign Affairs; Recurt, Interior; Duclarc, Finance; Admiral Carzy, Marine; Torolat, Public Works; Carnot, Public Instruction; Charas, War; Bethmont, Worship; Cremieux, Justice; Flocon, Commerce; Carteret, Under Secretary Interior; Lenand Renaud, Secretary Instruction.

A Correspondent of the London Times writes that Paris is as quiet as London, and that from Bologne to the Capital he had met no traces of the revolution.

In Italy the Popular Party—the War party of Rome had made the following demands which had been acquiesced in by the Pope—

1. No priest to be called into public employment.
2. Formal declaration of war; 3. Pius IX. to be the head of the Government; 4. Official Bulletin to be published daily of the war; 5. Encouragement to young men that they arm themselves and assist in driving from Italy the Austrians.

Subsequent reports affirm that the declaration of War had been revoked by his Holiness—in consequence of which he had been suspended. However, the Austrian Ambassador has been compelled to depart homeward. And the mass of the Italian people appear determined to continue no longer the serfs of Austria.

Hungary was in a state of open insurrection, and 100,000 Croats and other forces, were on the frontiers, only awaiting a signal from the newly proclaimed King of Hungary, Zora Georgiwick, to re-establish the ancient order of things.

**DARING HIGHWAY ROBBERY.**—A case of robbery of a most daring and aggravated kind, (a crime of rare occurrence in this county) took place on Friday evening last, at Roger's Hill, about twelve or thirteen miles from the town of Pictou. A person of the name of Alexander Baillie, of Earltown, having been in a small public house with several persons, was attacked a few rods from it on his road home, and received two violent blows on the head with a bludgeon. Before he became insensible, he recognised his assailant to be a person of the name of David McGuire, who had been in his company and drinking with him a few minutes before. After this brutal attack, the villain rifled the pockets of Baillie, and decamped with their contents, about forty shillings. He remained about the settlement for the two following days, and even had the foolhardiness to acknowledge that he was the perpetrator of the crime. Strange to say, though a magistrate resides within a mile of the spot, we are informed that no warrant was issued for his apprehension until a magistrate from Pictou went up on Monday afternoon, by which time McGuire had made his escape, and has not yet been found that we have heard of.—*Eastern Chronicle, Pictou, N. S.*
