Security Precautions Obvies Of Royalty

Tight security precautions yesterday put a damper on the tour through town by Queen Elizabeth and her husband Prince Philip following their arrival at RCAF station Summerside by BOAC transport.

People lining the parade route were dispersed by the motorcycle bearing the Royal Couple passing by traveling at approximately 40 miles an hour. Some of them had come as far as 50 miles away and barely got a glimpse of the couple as the Cadillac carrying her Majesty and Prince Philip sped by.

One elderly couple from Egmont Bay, a village approximately 25 miles west of here, stationed themselves on Water Street in the hopes of seeing the Queen but barely saw her due to the speed of the vehicle.

CHAIRS FOR LEGION

School children were positioned in front of the schools on Summer Street and chairs for the elderly were placed on the paved lot adjacent to the police station while the motorcade passed by.

Along the route local police wearing pistol slings with RCMP could be seen. A number of RCMP members were stationed along the railroad tracks of Water Street where the rear of buildings faced the street where the Royal party boarded the launches.

DIDN'T SLEEP SPEED

The cars, which included a motorcade Governor-General George F. Vanier, Minister L.B. Pearson, Solicitor General J. Watson MacNaughton, Governor General W.J. Macdonald, Premier Walter Shaw and Summerside Mayor P. Van der Meer, members of the RCMP didn't sleep speed until it arrived on Water Street and headed for the Queen, Prince and their entourage boarded motor launches to take them to the yacht.

City's 'Mild Demonstration' Wasn't Set By Separatists

A group of French-speaking youths were invited to perform for the Queen, were mistaken for separatist demonstrators when they gathered for an evening stroll Monday night.

Police said the group of about 20 members of the Les Feux - Follets, most of them from Montreal, found themselves being trailed by the RCMP when they went out sight-seeing in downtown Charlottetown.

The Royal couple arrived yesterday afternoon at the Summerside RCAF station and sailed to Charlottetown aboard the Royal yacht Britannia last night and this morning, giving them a chance to rest.

57 East Germans Free By Tunnel

BERLIN (AP) - Fifty-seven East Germans, in an operation beginning Saturday and ending early Monday, escaped to West Berlin from the East through a tunnel dug beneath the Communist built wall dividing this city.

Shortly after West Berlin authorities disclosed the mass escape Monday, East Germany charged West Berlin "armed bandits" came through the tunnel and murdered an East German border guard.

With the help of West Berliners, 23 men, 31 women and three children from the East passed through the tunnel in small groups in what was believed to be one of the largest mass escapes by tunnel since the wall was raised in 1961.

As some refugees left the exit in an abandoned bakery in West Berlin early Monday, a blast of sub-machine-gun fire from the other side of the wall showed the Communists had found the tunnel.

None of the refugees was hit. One West Berliner who aided their flight suffered a bruised head and knee injury during the operation.

At about 30 East German guards ringed the tunnel entrance in East Berlin. West police used a stretcher and placed in an ambulance. This evidently was the only man who died.

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
