ERRECT FENCE — The work of erecting a fence around the Irving Oil tanks has been almost completed under the foremanship of Mr. George Gordon. The fence is over six feet high with a slanted guard fence on top. Three sides have been completed, but it is not known whether or not the side facing the river will be fenced. At present there is none. The town council asked some months ago that the area be fenced as a fire hazard, but it is not clear if they intended the whole area around the tanks to be fenced. If such is the case the remaining part of the fence will undoubtedly be erected in the near future. NEW STREET — It has been rumored that a proposed street connecting the new road with the Sparrows Road is under consideration in the town of Montague. Rumor has it that the proposed street will go through the property formerly owned by Mr. Martin MacKinnon in a straight line to the Sparrows Road. Should this be true it would be of great benefit to the influx of residents, who would be able to acquire building lots, which at the present time, particularly respecting choice lots, are at a premium. Cleans Drains At Montague

"On Saturday the work of cleaning out the drains which had been blocked by recent heavy rains, was begun by Mr. Leo Collins, maintainer. Several full lengths and man holes were completely covered by sand and clay which had come from the higher locations. Mr. Collins has already cleaned out several, and expects to complete the work soon. He has also removed a heavy deposit of clay, which was also brought down by the overflow, at each approach of the bridge. This deposit has been getting larger since spring, and proved a traffic hazard. The area where clay and water lodged is now no longer a hazard to motorists, and particularly pedestrians, who have in the past, been liberally splashed by inconsiderate motorists. Mr. Collins has also erected a railing about the deep ditch near the Stewart property. It has been learned that one lady had received a severe gash from falling into this ditch which is adjacent to the sidewalk; and also that a car missed tipping into it by inches, after one wheel hovered over the opening. This has always been a dangerous ditch, and it is gratifying to see some work being done on it, as well as the streets which have been requiring attention.
