Scintillating Air Show Thrills 7,000 on Water's Side

SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN. A scintillating performance of aerobatics and precision flying by the darlings of the Canadian airways, the famed Golden Hawks, thrilled an estimated 7,000 spectators at RCAF Station Summerside Saturday afternoon as the air base opened its doors to the public for the annual Air Force Day program.

The aerial show, pronounced the best ever seen locally, providing edge-of-the-seat excitement for the huge crowd as the seven-plane team of Golden Hawks went through a series of rolls, loops, bombursts, high speed dives, formation maneuvers of such precision that all planes appeared to be flown by one man.

The skillful aerobatics, dramatized by speeds up to 650 miles per hour, climaxed another well-rehearsed air force day program coordinated by Wing Cmdr. W.J. Lewis.

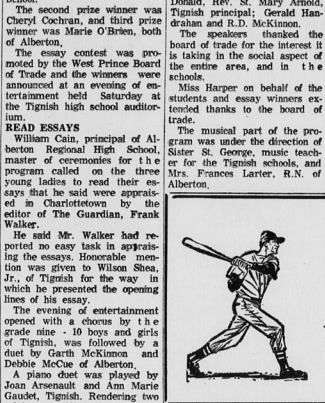
