Sussex Defeats Alberton 11-3

SUSSEX, N.B. (CP) — Sussex Legionaries won their inter-provincial intermediate B hockey series with Alberton Regals Monday night, overwhelming the Prince Edward Islanders 11-3 and taking the series 2-1.

Sussex captured at least the N.E.P.E.I. crown and may have become Maritime champions. The exact status was unknown pending official clarification. Legionaries had expected to play either Amherst or Antigonish in the Maritime final but Regals thought they won the N.S.-P.E.I. title by defeating Springfield which has been beaten by Amherst.

Buck wasn't nearly so reticent as his coach when it comes to predicting victory. Said Buck, "We'll beat them by two goals."

MONTREAL (CP) — The call went out Monday for Al Arbour to hurry to the aid of the ailing Detroit Red Wings.

So will defenceman Arbour, somewhere en route from Edmonton to Sudbury, please desert his automobile and report to coach Jimmy Skinner?

Reflecting on the 6-4 licking his Red Wings absorbed Saturday at the hands of Montreal Canadiens in the first game of the Stanley Cup final, Skinner looked over his casualty list with the second game coming up tonight, also on Montreal ice. Skinner tried to communicate with Arbour.

Arbour, formerly with the Wings, has finished his hockey chores for the season with Edmonton Flyers of the Western Hockey League. But he hadn't reached his home in Sudbury, in northern Ontario, and there were reports that his car had conked out on him.

"King" Clancy Out As Coach

TORONTO (CP) — Francis (King) Clancy, coach of Toronto Maple Leafs of the National Hockey League for the last three years, Monday stepped aside to allow a younger man to take his job.

General manager Hap Day announced that the fiery-tongued, colorful Clancy was taking over the quieter job of assistant manager and public relations executive.

At the same time, Day said there would be no immediate announcement of a replacement for the 54-year-old hockey great.

He mentioned three possibilities. One is Howie Meeker, 31, now coach of Pittsburgh Hornets of the American Hockey League, a Leaf farm club.

BRODA AND PIKE

The others are Walter (Turk) Broda, 41, former Leaf goalie now coaching Toronto Marlboros of the Ontario Hockey Association-Junior A League, and Al Pike, 38, coach of Winnipeg Warriors of the Western League.

Day said the appointment would have to await the outcome of playoffs of the various Toronto farm teams.

For Clancy the announcement means that he steps into another of the many jobs he has held in the game he loves. He's been a great player, a popular referee and coach.

He moves up behind Day who played with him on defense and who was coach and assistant manager of the Leafs before him.

Earlier Monday Conny Smythe, president of Maple Leaf Gardens, hinted that a change was in sight for Clancy.

"Youth must be served," he said. "This is a young man's business."

CLANCY HAPPY

Clancy is happy about the change.

"It suits me just fine," he said. "I had intended to ask to be relieved of the job as coach at the end of the season. I'm happy about the whole situation."

Smythe and Day said the new position is a promotion.

"Clancy never will be demoted," Smythe said. "This is a promotion for King."
