

PREPARING FOR PAVING AT SOURIS

The Island Construction Company, Mr. George Hawkins Manager is setting up its asphalt plant in Souris preparatory to the rebuilding of some six miles of pavement from Souris to Red Point. Work is already underway on the subgrading. The erection of the plant is nearing completion and it is expected that the actual laying of the asphalt will commence in about a week or ten days. R.A.F. Jet Planes Blast Rebel Arab Headquarters

SHARJAH, Arabian Trucial Coast (Reuters)—RAF jet planes today blasted the headquarters of an Arab rebellion in the pro-British Arab state of Oman and Muscat. Four Venom jet fighters flying from this British base drove in on the rebels' great round fortress at Nizwa with rockets and cannon fire. The rebels took the fortress last week. The fortress is the headquarters of the revolt leader, the imam (spiritual leader) of Oman, who is contesting the rule of the pro-British sultan of the territory. Rebel tribesmen supporting the imam against the sultan were warned in leaflets showered over the area that the air attacks would be carried out today. Reconnaissance planes reported Wednesday that the round fort at Nizwa was in the rebel hands and was flying the imam's personal flag. Sharjah is about 200 miles north of Nizwa. British troops have been moved to the base here from Bahrain. 12 SORTIES Nizwa fort, with 25-foot-high mudbrick walls and watchtowers, dominated the poverty-stricken mud cottages of about 6,000 villagers in the shadow of the 10,000-foot Jabal Akhdar, or green mountain. Wednesday RAF Venom jets flew 12 sorties against the fort at Izki, 50 miles from Nizwa, and their rockets gutted the structure. In the first of 12 sorties today, the Venoms screamed in on Nizwa at 700 feet with rockets and cannon shells thudding into the walls of the fort. Pilots returning to refuel and return said there was no sign of life beneath the imam's fluttering white flag over the fort or in the mud cottages surrounding it. "The fort, town and the surrounding date palm groves seemed quite deserted," said the detachment leader, Flt. Lt. Thomas Syme. Roll call was answered by seven members. Minutes were read and approved. NEW YORK (AP)—Evangelist Billy Graham Thursday forgave a man accused of stealing \$500 in offerings while posing as an usher at Graham's Yankee Stadium crusade rally. But he failed to persuade the man that the experience could be "a stepping stone to a new life." The evangelist arrived at the courthouse soon after Louis Silver, 46, former Los Angeles liquor salesman, had been released on \$2,300 bail pending a hearing. Graham greeted Silver, and the latter said: "I didn't do anything wrong." "I forgive you," said Graham. "I want to invite you to our rally. This experience ought to drive you toward God." Silver: "I'm in enough trouble already and my wife is sick." Graham: "We would like to help you get a job." Silver: "I don't want any charity." Graham: "What you need is to be brought closer toward God. God loves you and is willing to help you. I have forgiven you already. Let this experience be a stepping stone to a new life. Christ can help you." Silver, showing increasing signs of irritation, strode from the building. Graham went in to talk with Judge Eugene G. Schulz, who had set the bail.

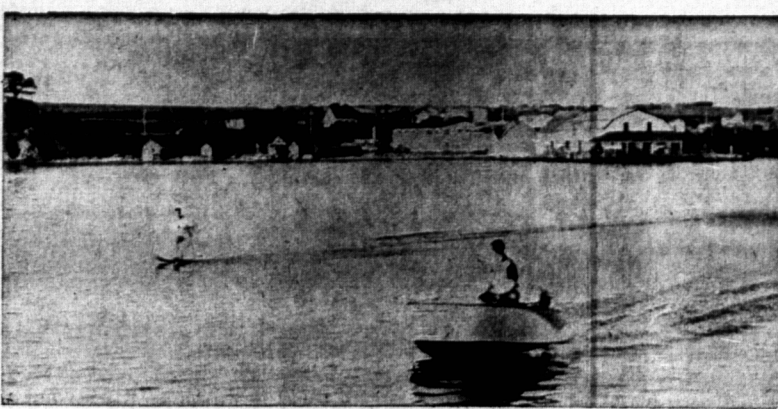

Newfoundland Problems Aired Before Commission

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—Provincial counsel H. Carl Goldenberg of Montreal told a three-man commission Wednesday that early methods used to attract industries to Newfoundland meant a loss of revenue to the province. He told the commission, investigating Newfoundland's financial arrangements with Ottawa, that until 25 years ago the province's chief industry was fishing, which today "is clearly a source of expenditure rather than of government revenue." The fishermen were poor and scattered in some 1,300 settlements along 6,000 miles of coastline. Boats were the main method of transportation. Highways and public services were almost non-existent. To acquire a more diversified economy, the government offered tracts of land to pulp and paper companies. Mining was also encouraged. New roads were built and services improved. However, agreements with the paper companies, "in addition to other concessions, granted them exemption from stampage for 99 years. In the circumstances at the time, and having regard to the results obtained, an inducement of this kind was justified." MINING SHOWS PROMISE "It has been estimated that forests now contribute about 32 per cent of the province's income. . . . But the contractual obligation assumed by the government of Newfoundland not to impose stampage charges beyond the year 2000 seriously restricted its capacity to raise revenues from its forest resources." Although the government has not imposed stampage charges, commissioner Sir Albert Walsh of St. John's, said it does receive a limited amount of revenue in the form of a \$2-an-acre rental and "they also pay taxes which find their way back to the province." Mr. Goldenberg said only min-
