John Mize Leads Yanks To 2-1 Win Over Indians Chicago Thump Bosox 6-

Cleveland Indians Wednesday came within one out of winning their first game at the Yankee Stadium in more than a year, but a two-out, ninth-inning double by Johnny Mize scored two runs, wrecked the Indians for the 13th straight time here and gave New York Yankees a thrilling 2-1 victory.

Mike Garcia appeared to have the victory wrapped up. He had surrendered only four singles and was working on his second straight shutout. The Tribe had manufactured their lone run in the first inning on two hits and two outs off Eddie Lopat.

Gil McDougald, however, opened the last of the ninth with a single. Garcia then struck out Gene Woodling and Joe DiMaggio fled out. Yogi Berra singled sending McDougald to third.

Mize, whose eight-inning homer beat Cleveland 3-2 yesterday, worked the count to one and one, then sliced a hump-knuckled hit over third. Bob Kennedy attempted to make a shoestring catch of the drive.

The ball bounced off his finger tips and before he could recover it, Berra followed McDougald across the plate with the winning run.

Garcia was so disgusted he flung his glove away as he stalked into the dugout.

The victory gave the American league-leading Yankees a full game margin over the Red Sox who were beaten 6-2 by Chicago White Sox in Boston. The third-place Indians now trail the Yankees by two games with the White Sox still 3 1/2 games off the pace.

Ken Holcombe turned up as Chicago White Sox eagerly sought "stopper" at Boston and his artistic five-hit pitching stint provided the victory.

He faced only 32 men while snapping his fourth-place club's five-game losing streak.

But Holcombe owed much to Don Lenhardt, who belted his second three-run homer here in two days against lefty Mel Parnell in the sixth inning.

Up to that time, Parnell, victor over the White Sox in three previous tries, had a 1-0 lead.

Before Lenhardt stroked his 11th four-bagger Nelly Fox and Minnie Minoso, the league's top batsman, slashed successive singles with one out.

Gil Coan blasted a triple and three singles to pace Washington's 14-hit attack on four Detroit pitchers which gave the Senators a 7-4 American League victory over the Tigers.

Detroit hammered Don Johnson for three runs in the first inning but he braced to post his sixth victory. Freddie Hutchinson, smashed for two runs in the second inning and two more in the third, was charged with the defeat, his sixth against eight wins.

Front-running Brooklyn Dodgers pushed their latest winning streak to five games as Preacher Roe pitched his 14th victory and 12th complete game in defeating Chicago Cubs 6-2.

Roe, the National League's winningest pitcher, gave up eight hits, but walked only one and fanned six, while his mates made most of four Cub errors and seven half-off starter Bob Rush and his successor, Walt Dubiel.

Rush was tagged for six hits and five runs in seven innings including Gil Hodges' 30th homer.

The Cubs took a first-inning lead when Eddie Miksis slammed Roe's first pitch for a four-bagger. Hodges averaged it with his blast in the second. It put the husky first-baseman even with Babe Ruth's record pace for 61 games.

Brooklyn went ahead in the fourth when Jackie Robinson and Hodges singled. Roy Campanella

Brilliant Battle In Tennis Tourney

The finest game of tennis that has been seen in Charlottetown for a long time was played in the P. E. I. Senior Closed Tournament yesterday, when Sgt/Ldr. LaCombe, R.C.A.F., advanced into the final round by defeating A. H. Anderson. Both are fine players and both were in good form last night. Anderson took the first set 6-4, but he tired more quickly than LaCombe who won the second and third sets 6-3, 6-1.

In the fourth set, Anderson made a spirited attempt at a comeback, and the set went to 14 games before LaCombe was able to take it. S.E. LaCombe has been seen in action here before, and his brilliant form was no surprise, but it is the first time that Anderson has met such stiff opposition on these courts, giving him an opportunity to demonstrate that he is a strong tennis player of considerable worth.

In another semi-final match played at the same time, Earl Smith defeated F/Lt Levittin 6-0, 6-3, 11-9. Although Smith won the match in three straight sets, Levittin played a strong game, and scored a number of spectacular shots.

In the final match of the ladies doubles, Wanda MacMillan and Helen Larter emerged victorious, defeating Margaret Dunton and Joan Armstrong 6-3, 6-0, to take the title.

Only one match is scheduled for today at 5:30 p.m. Ivan Dowling and Leah MacMahon will meet Carl Bradley and Elizabeth Willett in a second round mixed doubles match.

Hamilton Take Lead In Regatta

PORT DALHOUSIE, Ont. July 25 (CP)—Hamilton Leanders today took the lead in the point total of the four-day 69th Royal Canadian Henley regatta before several hundred spectators on the old Welland Canal.

Only one of the 14 events of the first day's card counted toward the point total, the winner of which is presented the Maple Leaf shield donated by the Governor-General, Viscount Alexander. St. Catharines are the defending champions, having won the points since the shield was first donated in 1949.

SOUTHAMPTON, N.Y. July 25 (CP)—Tony Trabert, 20-year-old University of Cincinnati student, today moved into the quarter-final round of the 61st Southampton invitation tennis tournament with a 6-3, 6-2 victory over Lorne Main of Vancouver.

Main, young Canadian Davis Cupper, was the last survivor of three Canadians in the tournament. Henri Rochon and Brendan Macken of Montreal were eliminated yesterday in the second round.

VANCOUVER, July 25 (CP)—Eight heats in 25 events—with no startling times in any of them—today opened the Canadian swimming championships here. Allan Gilchrist of Ocean Falls, B.C., had the extra kick and won the first heat of the men's 100-yard freestyle in 58.8 seconds. Ron Crane of Vancouver and Peter Mingie of Montreal finished in a tie for second at 57.3.

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Big Crowd View Close Racing At St. Peter's

The St. Peter's Raceway got away to a flying start for the season yesterday afternoon when a Wednesday holiday crowd, that filled the stands and grounds to overflowing, witnessed some of the closest racing held over the Island circuit to date this summer.

Although speed wasn't a predominant feature, close exciting racing was the order of the day when three of the four classes were forced into extra heats to decide the purse winners.

Driving, blanket finishes to the wire in practically every heat compelled the judges to call for the assistance of the photo finish camera on a number of occasions before the final positions at the finish could be declared.

In the second heat of the class tied pace a nasty accident occurred that involved two horses and their drivers that sent Alfred Lowery of Montague to hospital suffering from a possible fractured ankle and laceration of the face and head. Driving his own entry, Captain Missouri, Lowery and his horse were upset when a tightly packed field of ten horses came around the upper turn to the three-eighths pole. Captain Missouri was trailing in second place behind Lindy H. driven by George McIntyre, also of Montague, when the accident occurred.

Mr. Lowery received his injuries when run over by another entry, Billy Budlong, after he had been thrown to the track, upsetting that horse and its driver, Randall MacDonald of Milltown Cross, as well.

Lindy H. won the heat, but was set back to sixth position for interference, but later went on to win the third and fourth heats for race honors. The fourth heat was a raceoff with Bonnie June, owned by Raymond Beers of Harcourt, N.B., driven by Harvey Cormier, who was the winner of the second heat on Lindy H's setback. Harold Hill, owned and driven by Harold Stead, Brackley, won the first heat for the third winner but was drawn in the extra heat.

Lorne Letcher's Jenny Kalmuck, the only Springhill, N.E. stable entry, was the straight heat winner, clipping off all three heats of the number one classified trot and pace. Driver O'Donnell was the winner of a special \$25 prize donated by R.L. Burge, Five Houses, for driving the horse trotting the fastest mile of the meet when he guided Jenny to a mark of 2:12 2-5 in the second heat. The caretaker of the horse, Bill Gourlay, won the \$12.50 prize donated by Albert Quigley and Sons, St. Peter's.

Rosalie Hooper of the H & S Stables, City, and driven by Willard Kelly of Southport, waged terrific battles down the final stretch with the Springhill horse in the second and third heats that took photo finishes to show Jenny Kalmuck in front by a nose in both heats.

Other leading race battles saw Just Flika, owned and driven by Harold Oudmore of Brackley, win race honors in the number two classified trot and pace in a fourth heat raceoff with Jimmy A. and Lily Marlene, who won the second and third heats respectively after Flika copped the first. Lily Marlene, owned by Rhodes Warren, City, and driven by James McGregor, was first under the wire in the second heat, but was set back to second position for swerving on the stretch. Owner and driver Oudmore also won the special \$25 prize, donated by Dingwell and Rossiter, Morrell, for the fastest pace, 2:15 2-5, while Clarence Wood won the caretaker's prize.

The other extra heat event was won by Ruthera, driven by Ike Moreside and owned by Oliver Gallant, City. Losing the first heat of the classified trot to Roy Bevin's Anyway, driven by James McGregor, Ruthera took the second heat, placed second again to Judy Kalmuck with Willard Kelly up in the third and went on to take race honors in the raceoff.
