SUICIDE.—A young woman by the name of Pelletier, and mother of four children, committed suicide at St. Leon, County of Maskinonge, Quebec, the other day, by throwing herself into a well. Despondency is supposed to have been the cause of the action.
LEAGUE OF THE CROSS.—At High Mass in St. Dunstan's Cathedral, yesterday, His Lordship Bishop McIntyre, in the course of a brief address on temperance, intimated that the date of the meeting for the establishment of a branch of the order of the League of the Cross in this city would be announced on Sunday next.
PUGILISTIC.—There are again prospects of Joe Lannan, the South Boston heavyweight, and Jack Ashton, of Providence, meeting in a glove contest in the near future. At a recent meeting of sporting men it was decided to have the battle occur in Boston before a limited number of spectators, for a purse of at least \$1,000.
BURIED.—The remains of Joseph M. Stroppe, who came to his death at Souris, were interred on the 14th, in the Protestant Cemetery, at Souris West, Rev. Mr. Lodge officiating at the services. The deceased belonged to Hoylston, Guysborough, Co., N. S., and leaves a wife and two children, to mourn over his untimely end.
POLICE COURT.—Six men appeared before the Stipendiary Magistrate this forenoon charged with being drunk and disorderly. Peter McCleary was fined \$8 and 20 days; Joseph Macdonald, \$4 and 20 days; Thomas Fennel, \$20 and 20 days; John McLean, \$5 and 10 days; Ronald McInnis, \$5 and 10 days; John Macdonald, \$4 and 10 days.
MATRIMONIAL.—The nuptials of William S. Hacker and Ella P. Montgomery, both of Summerside, P. E. I., were celebrated at the residence of T. Archibald, Truro, on Wednesday morning, by Rev. T. H. Murray, uncle of the bride. Immediately after the ceremony the happy couple took the train for Moncton en route for their Island home.
FIRE.—A fire broke out at Point du Chene about one o'clock on Saturday morning, and before it could be extinguished several buildings were destroyed. The fire broke out in Sherard & Irving's store, from which it spread to the buildings of John Macdonald, Eddie Macdonald, McLellan and Girardin and others. The loss is heavy and the insurance small.
BAD WEATHER.—Says the Agriculturist: The weather during the last few weeks has been extremely unfavorable for harvesting operations, and from all sections of the province come reports that many fields of grain are yet unharvested. Some of this grain is already considerably damaged, and unless fine weather sets in very soon, much of it will be entirely destroyed. The continued wet weather is also having a bad effect on the potato crop.
CITY PROPERTY SEIZED.—Portland, St. John, has a small civic sensation. Last spring a man named George Buckle in a suit for damages for injuries received through the agency of a defective sidewalk, was awarded damages of \$219 and costs. Not receiving the cash, Mr. Buckle employed a lawyer. Application was made to the chamberlain and to the mayor, but the cash was not forthcoming. On Friday morning the climax was reached when Deputy Sheriff Rankine wended his way to Portland and levied on a span of fire department horses, leaving a constable in charge. The authorities are awake now, and it is understood that a council meeting will be called to deal with the matter.
ASSAULT AND BATTERY.—While twenty or thirty men were in pursuit of the offending Orient's crew, the latter attacked two young men belonging to the place who were coming from a prayer meeting. One of them escaped without injury, but the other, a young man by the name of Darrach, who is in the employ of Dr. McIntyre, did not fare so well. He tried first to escape from his assailant by getting into the nearest house, but failing to effect an entrance, he ran for the back yard, where he was confronted by a huge dog. In a struggle over the head with an axe handle. Though stunned he managed to get out of the way of his pursuers into safe quarters, and from his swollen and blackened face, it is evident that he did not escape any too soon.

DISASTROUS FLOOD.
10,000 PERSONS DROWNED.
SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Oct. 14.
A China mail received here says a disastrous flood occurred near Fang Shan Haien, in the vicinity of Peking, on the night of Aug. 13th. Seven and a half inches of rain fell in Peking and an immense volume of water collected in a ravine about Lien Li Ho, and suddenly broke in upon twenty villages. More than 10,000 people were drowned and a large number of draft animals. The villages in the valleys near Peking are in danger every season, as the hills are destitute of trees and the waters flow together in fearful torrents unimpeded by vegetation.

Counterfeit \$10 bills on the Canadian Bank of Commerce are in circulation here. They are clever imitations; but the shading of letters comprising the work "Ten" on the face of the note is unlike that of the genuine.
The Finance Committee of the Winter Carnival Association have decided to recommend the Executive Committee to arrange for the holding of a carnival in 1889, which will eclipse all previous ones.
One day last week Mung Kow, a merchant of this city, was prevented from visiting New York on business under the new American Chinese Exclusion Act. This gentleman is a naturalized British subject, but when he applied at the United States custom office he was told he could not cross the boundary, as the Exclusion Act covered his case. Meaning his business is suffering, and he asks, "What about my being a British subject?" and expresses his intention of testing the matter, if such can be done, in the courts.
Yellow Jack—Doctors On Strike.
JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Oct. 14.
The sensation of to-day has been the resignation of all physicians of the medical bureau on account of a communication in an evening paper showing the expense of maintaining this corps to be \$7000, and advising the discharge of these volunteers from further service. The sentiment of the community strongly condemns this action. To-night they all agreed to attend patients as usual. The Board of Health is to investigate and report. To-day the new cases numbered 18 and the deaths 2.

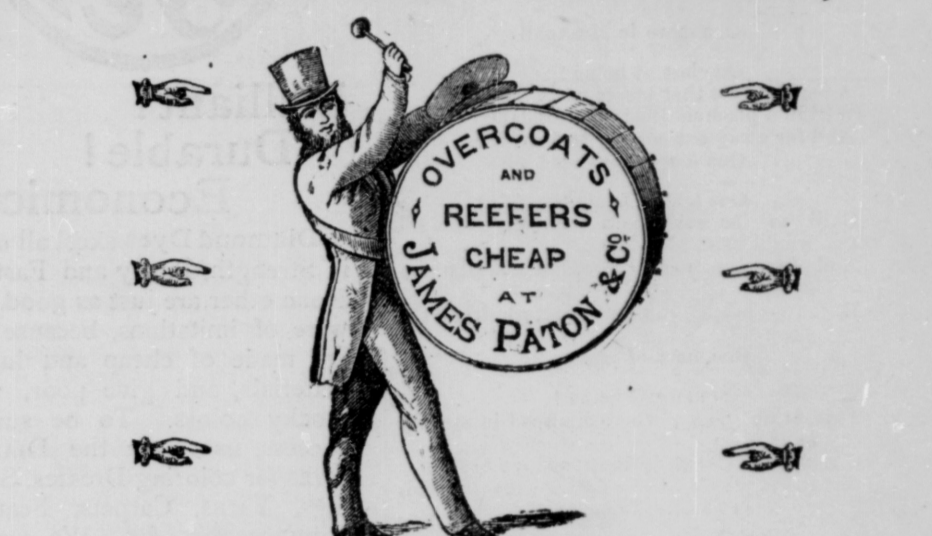
