A VALUABLE COIN.—Martin Chapman, of Fort Lawrence, possesses a very rare, noble copper coin which was plucked up on the marsh below his residence. The coin is remarkably well preserved. It is a coin struck in honor of John of Gaunt, Duke of Lancaster, England, about the year 1345. It was turned up by the plough last fall and probably brought to the country with the early French settlers during the period dating from 1671 to 1784 or thereabouts.—Moncton Times.

AN ISLANDER DROWNED.—The Halifax Mail says: Angus O'Hanley, who Capt. Freeman Munro, of the schooner Lawrence A. Munro, reported at Gloucester had been lost at sea on the 22d August last by the swamping of a dory while alongside of the vessel, leaves a wife and three children at Dartmouth. The deceased was a native of Souris, P. E. Island, and had been separated from his family for a few years past, only visiting them occasionally. He was last in this port about a year ago.

The Presbyterian Synod.

St. John, Oct. 8. The most important business done by the Presbyterian Synod yesterday was the appointment of a professor of the New Testament Exegesis and kindred subjects in Halifax Divinity College. Rev. Robert A. Falconer, M. A., B. D., son of Rev. Alex. Falconer, of Pictou, was appointed. His present appointment is for three years, and was unanimously agreed to. The next place of meeting will be Truro, on the first Tuesday in October.

Races at Yarmouth.

Yarmouth, Oct. 8. In the driving park races yesterday, a St. John mare, Annie Sprague, won the two-year-old class. Time 1:36—half mile heats. The Yarmouth stallion Twilight was second. The free-for-all trotting race was taken by the St. John horse Stanley in three straight heats. Best time 2:37, with R. E. Fitts' Bridgetown horse Sir Brenton second. Joe Howe, the pacing stallion, paced an exhibition mile, making it in 2:30. This time was not up to his record, owing to the high wind prevailing.

New Brunswick Politics.

St. John, Oct. 8. At the independent convention for King's yesterday three candidates directly opposed to the ministry were nominated, viz., Warden Keirstead, Warden Fowler and Dr. Gilchrist. A meeting of York County organization, held in Fredericton, nominated H. H. Pitts as a candidate for the Legislature.

A Snug Surplus.

Ottawa, Oct. 8. The financial statement for the first quarter of the fiscal year is most cheering. The surplus is \$3,560,000.

General Telegraphic News.

Quebec, Oct. 6. A proclamation has just been issued by the Lieutenant Governor of Quebec ordering that no licensee shall cut cedar for shingles in this province unless it is to be manufactured within the province. The reason appears to be that cedar was being cut and shipped in the rough to the United States, or to New Brunswick, to be prepared there for export.

Ottawa, Oct. 6.—G. R. Parkin, of Imperial Federation fame, is here, and had interviews with several ministers today. He is now commissioned to write a series of articles on the trade relations between Canada and the United States, and is gathering the latest and most reliable data for that purpose.

Montreal, Oct. 6.—As a result of the board of health regulations enforced at Montreal and Quebec, the Hamburg-American Packet Co. has withdrawn its vessels from the St. Lawrence for the rest of the year. The loss to upper Canadian merchants by this move will be considerable, but the officials of the company here state that no other course was open to them in view of the arbitrary conduct of the health officials. The boats have been diverted to Boston, and upper Canadian merchandize by this line will have to come through the States.

Baltimore, Md., Oct. 6.—The proceedings of the second day of the triennial Protestant Episcopal convention were set aside to receive the delegation from the Church of Canada. Bishop Jones, of Newfoundland, the Bishop of Fredericton, the Bishop of Hamilton and Niagara, Rev. Canon Mills of Montreal and Dr. Davidson, lay secretary of the Provincial Synod of Canada, addressed the house and expressed the great pleasure they experienced in addressing such a distinguished body of men. The Canadian bishops were invited to take seats in the house when convenient to them.

Victoria, B. C., Oct. 6.—Donald McCush and Andrew Thomson, two of the crew of the schooner Maris, seized by Russian, August 21, off Copper Island, reached here yesterday via San Francisco. These two men escaped and will, if possible, induce the government to send relief to their companions, whose condition they describe as deplorable. They say the Russians won't keep the prisoners if they have to feed them. "We heard at Petropaulovsk of one British hunter who tried to row away in an open boat rather than remain longer. When ordered to stop by the Russian patrol, he refused, but was shot dead and his body pitched overboard. We were told the officers had orders to continue seizing as long as there was a schooner in northern waters and to blow up or scuttle any seized vessel that could not be conveniently taken care of."
