Critical No Jobs For Immigrants

OTTAWA, (CP)—Magistrate Joachim Sauve Thursday criticized the citizenship department for allowing immigrants to fall into the ranks of the unemployed. He was commenting on the case before him of two jobless Hungarian immigrants who were arrested for loitering in Ottawa's Union Station. "We have had a number of these cases," Magistrate Sauve said. "They present a grave problem to the court. Many immigrants admitted here cannot find a situation. I feel that better screening should be made by the department concerned." Citizenship Minister Harris, commenting on the criticism, said: "We make every effort to ensure that immigrants find suitable employment. In some cases, they do not have jobs waiting for them on their arrival but we find them positions as soon as we can." "These two men were really in trouble," said the magistrate, "out of work, with no money and without the language."
