To Organize Credit Union

A Summerside credit union open to all residents of the town will be organized this evening at a public meeting in the Summerside High School auditorium.

The only objection to the new Act "The Lobster Trap Loan Act, 1953" in the Legislature yesterday came in the form of suggestions that instead of a loan there should be an outright grant to fishermen who suffered severely from the heavy rains of last spring.

Mr. John A. MacDonald, chief financial critic of the Opposition, stated that rumors were persistent that the aid under the Act would constitute a grant rather than a loan, and he asked for clarification of this point from Hon. Eugene Cullen, Minister of Industry and Natural Resources, who was promoting the bill.

In explaining the bill, Hon. Mr. Cullen said that though no security might be demanded prior to a loan the fishermen would undoubtedly be asked to file a statement of their losses. He did not believe that the Act would increase the number of traps being put out by fishermen and intimated that more traps would be set out if it was the opinion of many experienced lobstermen that there were too many traps being set out now.

Gives Figures On Potato Pickers In Prince County

300 potato pickers from various parts of the Maritimes, passed through the National Employment Office in Summerside this fall, according to information obtained from an official of that department yesterday.

Of this number 264 were from the Sydney area, 51 from Moncton, 33 from New Glasgow, 18 from Inverness, 15 from Amherst, seven from Newcastle, and six from Charlottetown.

In addition to the ones mentioned above 157 other placements were made, consisting of men from land who had completed work with the farmer to whom they had first been assigned.

This year, the number of pickers placed by the National Employment Office is 125 more than last year. No more pickers will be brought in this year and 34 return transfers have already been issued by the Summerside Office, however, officials believe that others not included in this figure have already left for home at their own expense without checking through the office.

In order to receive transportation assistance from the National Employment Office the pickers must have completed their work with the farmer to whom he was assigned. The Office, also, cannot issue return transfers while there are still requests in the Office for pickers.

Before the picking season began the Summerside office sent letters to about 550 potato growers in the county explaining how the office could assist in providing them with extra help during the potato harvesting season.

It is believed that the bulk of the crop has now been harvested and the demand for pickers has now fallen off sharply.

William Currie, President P. E. I. Liberal Association, Gilbert Clements, President Young Liberal Association, and Mr. Cecil Miller.

It has been in the Department only a month, the Minister continued, and am not in a position to say a great deal that would be authoritative and of interest except that with an annual expenditure of more than two hundred million dollars we are determined to see that the taxpayer's dollar is spent in such a manner that he will be getting a fair return on his investment. Prince Edward Island, he said, "will receive every consideration economically desirable."

"People are more interested in performance than in promises," he said in touching on the Federal election, "and the vote of the Canadian people indicated their mood."

The Minister referred to insurance on fishing boats and gear, and the Trans-Canada Highway programme in which he said P. E. Island was in the forefront of development. He also dealt with the forestry programme in which the Provincial Government was co-operating with the Federal Government. The National Park he described as one of the finest across Canada which had become even more popular as a tourist attraction through the hospitality of the Island people.

He also touched briefly on pensions, unemployment insurance and improvement in fishing boats and lobster ap advances, elections and hoped to improve the labour situation here when he went to Ottawa. Hon. B. Earle MacDonald stressed the need of work which could be provided if a ship were brought here for overhaul.

House Discusses Legislation Re Loans To Lobster Fishermen

The only objection to the new Act "The Lobster Trap Loan Act, 1953" in the Legislature yesterday came in the form of suggestions that instead of a loan there should be an outright grant to fishermen who suffered severely from the heavy rains of last spring.

Mr. John A. MacDonald, chief financial critic of the Opposition, stated that rumors were persistent that the aid under the Act would constitute a grant rather than a loan, and he asked for clarification of this point from Hon. Eugene Cullen, Minister of Industry and Natural Resources, who was promoting the bill.

In explaining the bill, Hon. Mr. Cullen said that though no security might be demanded prior to a loan the fishermen would undoubtedly be asked to file a statement of their losses. He did not believe that the Act would increase the number of traps being put out by fishermen and intimated that more traps would be set out if it was the opinion of many experienced lobstermen that there were too many traps being set out now.

Mr. Frank Myers, First Queen's, expressed the opinion that the bill was entirely unnecessary. He felt that since Western Canadian farmers were given direct grants, instead of loans, the fishermen here should be treated the same way.

Hon. Mr. Cullen said that in past years aid had been given fishermen through loans, not grants, and no departure could be made from this precedent. He said that figures revealed that despite the losses suffered last spring the lobstermen had made almost as much money, on the average, this year as last. However, the Minister pointed out that many of them had greater losses than others and he marked that even if the figures showed almost as much money "statistics won't feed a man's wife and family."

Poaching Spreading
He drew to the attention of the Legislature that in many cases the canneries here were not able to compete with the prices paid by buyers from certain provinces. He stated his belief that if the situation continues the industry will be out of business in five years. He also said that poaching was spreading to all parts of the island and said that it meant a great loss in future earnings to lobstermen and was rapidly presenting not only an economic problem, but a social one as well.

Mr. Frank MacNutt, Liberal, Third Queen's, said he felt the first step in preventing the taking of small lobsters and in the fishermen themselves. He suggested they might control the industry by informing authorities of fishermen taking small lobsters.

Mr. George Saville, Liberal, Fifth King's, was critical of some packers whom he thought should help control the industry instead of persisting in buying undersized lobsters. He cited the example of lobster fishermen of the State of Maine who agreed among themselves to take back any fish under nine inches in length. Although it was feared the action might be detrimental at the time the speaker said the value of the industry was approximately \$35 million annually.

He thought that there were too many fishermen willing to sacrifice future dollars for present cents, and suggested that more wardens like Spurgeon Jenkins were needed here.

Mr. R. R. Bell, Leader of the Opposition, reminded members that he also represented a fishing district, (Second Queen's), and agreed that there was no shortage of lobstermen. "The only trouble is to catch them," he said that many fishermen were keen to court for having possession of undersize lobsters which he said in some cases were only one-third-second of an inch below the legal limit.

He stated that there was no intention on the part of the fishermen to break the law and that most of the cases in Rustico were the result of the men not following the regulations. He said that the new regulations regarding the increase in the carapace measurements. However, he wondered why fines imposed were so high in Queen's and King's Counties while Prince County apparently enjoyed "dollar day rates."

Cries Western Cattlemen
Mr. Bell was critical of the Federal Government for its failure to make an outright grant to Maritime fishermen in view of what had been done for Western cattlemen and for hog breeders on the outbreak of hog cholera there. He also drew to the attention of the House what he termed unfair spread in the price received by fishermen for codfish and that the difference ranged from two cents per pound for dried cod to primary producers to 40 cents paid by consumers.

Mr. John A. MacDonald felt that many fishermen would have no need of a loan if they had been granted the requested seven-day extension of the season during the summer. It was in reply to his insistent questioning that Hon. Mr. Eugene Cullen made it clear that the Bill before the House was to provide loans, not grants.

Many Complications
Mr. Harvey Douglas, Second King's, agreed that perhaps grants might be better, but thought this means would provide too many complications. He disagreed with previous speakers that fishermen should be blamed for placing their lobster traps in shoal water. "You must put your traps where the fish are," in commenting on the loan versus grant controversy he wondered if there might not be a possibility that the Government would conveniently forget about payment of the loans in two or three years time. He felt, however, that fishermen should fully insure their traps, especially when the money to replace them is advanced by the Government.

Mr. J. W. D. Campbell, First Prince, also asked why the Federal Government should object to direct aid in view of the past policy.
