## Island Government Has Made Proposals

An announcement was made by Premier Alex Campbell yesterday that the provincial government has made proposals to Prime Minister Pearson and the minister of transport with regard to future car-ferry service between Port Borden and Cape Tormentine.

The first proposal requested that the car ferries now under trusteeship to Canadian National Railways be returned to the department of transport and operated by that department in future without significant loss or sacrifice of salary or other benefits to employees had operations been left in CNR hands.

With respect to the second proposal, Premier Campbell stated: "realizing that operation of the causeway must be a continuous service without interruption and also realizing the future need of a Crown corporation to administer the causeway, we have urged that the government of Canada now establish a federal administrative corporation

and that the operation of the docks and ferries might immediately be referred to this corporation."

The Premier said that this arrangement would provide continuity not only in transportation but also in assuring that those now engaged in ferry service of future work in causeway administration.

The third proposal asked that the federal government investigate the establishment of a provincial Crown corporation responsible for our transportation link with the mainland with a guarantee from the federal government that the services be maintained without cost to the province and without limiting or relieving the federal government of its obligation to maintain this vital transportation link.

"I have not received a response as yet, but it is my intention to press this matter to a final and satisfactory conclusion," the Premier stated.

## Magistrate Remands Accused

SUMMERSIDE — A Miminigash youth, Roy John Callaghan, pleaded guilty to three separate charges, two involving assault, in Prince County Magistrate's Court before Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald here yesterday morning.

The accused pleaded guilty to causing a disturbance outside the Lot Seven dance hall shortly after midnight on Saturday morning by fighting, and also pleaded guilty to the assault of Maynard Butler, Miminigash, causing him bodily harm on Saturday afternoon. He entered a guilty plea to assaulting Alberton RCMP Constable Burns in the course of his duty, when Burns tried to arrest Callaghan later that evening.

Accused, who is under a suspended sentence for break, entry and theft dating for one year from April 1, 1966, was remanded in custody to Friday, September 16, for sentencing.

Three Miminigash men, Vernon Dale Costain, Gary Ingham Costain and Nelder William Costain, pleaded not guilty to separate charges of assaulting Leigh Ramsay, Campbellton, causing him bodily harm. The cases were adjourned to September 16 for trial.

George Henry Williams, Ellerslie, was fined \$75 and costs or 15 days for impaired driving. A Bunbury man was fined \$10 and costs or 30 days for intoxication in a public place.

## Premier Campbell Discusses Services

Premier Campbell was in Halifax over the weekend where he had preliminary discussion with Maritime Tel. and Tel. Company Limited regarding improved rural and urban telephone services in the province.

He will again meet with them in a week when he returns from Ottawa. The premier and Earle Hickox, provincial treasurer, are travelling to Ottawa today to attend the federal-provincial conference on monetary and tax-sharing agreements.

While in Halifax, the premier expressed personal doubt that it would be in the best interests of the province for the P.E.I. Government to take over the Island Telephone Company due to costs

in installation of a direct dialing system for all Island points. "If the Bell Telephone Company does not obtain control of Maritime Tel. and Tel. in Nova Scotia, we will have the advantage of comparing the relative position of New Brunswick's telephone system, managed by Bell, and Nova Scotia's system, managed locally."

"The future experience of our neighboring provinces should give us a clear understanding of our future action," stated Premier Campbell.

## GRANDMOTHER JOINS CORPS

BEL AIR, Md. (AP)—Mrs. Mabel Yewell, a 70-year-old grandmother, has forsaken the rocking chair to sign for a two-year hitch in India with the Peace Corps.

Mrs. Yewell, a nurse, hopes to serve in a planned parthenoid clinic, either in Bombay or Poona.

"I hope I can give something and I know I will learn much," she said. "I'm pleased that I'm physically well enough to be accepted. The peppery five-foot-four grandmother of four weighs 135 pounds."

She has passed all the Peace Corps mental and physical examinations. Yet to come is the four-week training period. "I don't think I'm ready for a rocking chair," she told Peace Corps officials.

## Supersonic Air Travel Is Studied

LONDON (CP) — Commonwealth aviation experts have made a start in jointly studying the implications of introducing supersonic air travel on the routes of the world.

This was one outcome of the sixth meeting of the Commonwealth Air Transport Council, which has ended a week-long discussion among some 20 countries, including Canada. Representing Canada was J.R. Baxter, transport department representative in Britain; Walter McLeish, chief aeronautical engineer, air services branch; Eric Winsor, airports director and George Scott, assistant deputy minister, air services.

McLeish delivered a paper on the philosophy of airworthiness and safety in Canada, explaining the systems that have been evolved through the years. Representatives of developing countries said they found this useful in making their own plans.

Discussion on technical assistance and technical training emphasized the great demand for training of technical personnel throughout the Commonwealth and the inadequacy of existing training facilities. Canada already has trained many Commonwealth technicians and is willing, it is understood, to do anything within its resources to continue the help.

FIND MORE BODIES VIENTIANE (AP) — Police announced Saturday 20 additional bodies have been found in a Mekong River flood that has afflicted this capital city of Laos for nearly a fortnight, boosting the flood death toll to 34.

START ARMY EXERCISE KINGSTON, Ont. (CP)—Operation Nautchgirl, designed to exercise the Canadian army's mobile command in the field, will begin today. The 1st Canadian Signal Regiment will leave Kingston for Camp Farnham, 40 miles southeast of Montreal. It will be backed up by part of a regiment from Valcartier, Que., about 25 men and six vehicles from Rivers, Man., and 60 officers from Mobile Command headquarters in Montreal.

## \$100 Fines Are Levied

Cyril John Davis, CFB Summerside, and Ivan Joseph MacPhee, Charlottetown were each given similar fines of \$100 and costs or 15 days for driving while impaired when they appeared before Magistrate James B. Johnston QC, in Queens County Magistrate's Court yesterday. The assault was against Joseph Anes MacAvinn, Westmoreland, and the case was adjourned until Wednesday, September 14, after the accused pleaded not guilty. The trial is to take place at the City Police Court. The accused is represented by C.R. MacQuaid.

## Association Is Planning Campaign

SUMMERSIDE — A beauty campaign to rid Prince Edward Island of old car bodies is a special project now underway by the P.E.I. Village Commissioners Association.

The special committee, under the chairmanship of Earl Cannon of St. Eleanor, says that the problem came before regular meetings of the commission and that it came to a head at their semi-annual session at Miscouche in May. He stated that the committee had been pressing for some system to dispose of old car bodies, thus helping to eliminate eyesores in the natural beauty of the Island.

The realization of the project was hoped for by the centennial year, Cannon stated.

The provincial government has been approached in the person of municipal affairs Minister Keir Clarke, who was presented with a brief by the three commissioners on the committee. Mr. Cannon said that in its recommendation, the committee has proposed what they feel is a solution. The plan calls for setting up a company which would collect and press for shipment all car bodies. The plan would also include an annual old car cleanup province-wide annually.

The project would have to be subsidized by the government, Mr. Clarke said. He said that the committee has recommended a five dollar subsidy per car, with increasing each registration by one dollar. It would not boost taxes in this way, Mr. Clarke added.

Other committee members are Hector Buote of Tignish and Hamilton Douglas of Mt. Stewart. Mr. Clarke concluded by stating that the committee has completed its brief and it has been presented to the government. "It is now up to the government from here," he commented.
