SOME NEW AND CHARMING SCHOOL GOWNS FOR CHILDREN.

Some Pretty Styles that Combine Simplicity with Dressiness—A Becoming Collarlette—House Waits for Economy.

There are many pretty styles for school gowns this fall combining simplicity with as much dressiness as is needed in a dress to study in, and which yet must look neat and natty in going to and from school.



Another pretty design is shown in Fig. 2. It should be worn with a gamp. The gamp is shirred at the neck and held in position by a draw inserted in the casing.



In choosing a design like the above described it will be found to make up well in any of the fall fabrics. A very pretty gown made from this pattern was in black cheviot, having sage color, black and light blue in the plaid, and the ruffle consisted of dark green silk with a pinked-edge. There was a small ruffle in the center made of the silk.
