Montague High School Had Outstanding Year

Forty-two graduates, the largest in the history of Montague High School, took part in the commencement exercises in the school auditorium which the large number of parents and friends filled to capacity.

The exercises were opened by the high school glee club which sang the school song, an original composition by their director, Mrs. Ralph Beck.

Chairman for the evening was K.T. Norris, who introduced the principal, John Hughes.

SUCCESS

Mr. Hughes spoke of the excellence of the school facilities which were being expanded each year and of the high standing of Montague High students who went on to universities.

He felt this was a compliment to the teaching staff throughout the Memorial School and the high school. He cautioned the pupils to choose a career in which they would be happy, as only happiness would bring real success.

TO FESTIVAL

Mr. Hughes made special mention of Miss Janet Campbell, a grade 10 student, who had been chosen by the Canada Council as one of four Island students to attend the Stratford Festival in Ontario. He also made special mention of Leslie Poole, grade 12 student, who won second place in an art contest covering both Canada and the United States.

Following the principal's report, prizes were presented to the various classes.

Miss Marion Bruce, valedictorian, addressed the graduates. Addressing the graduates, Malcolm MacKenzie, director of education, told them that education gave the student a greater range in which to select a position in life; that if life was to be meaningful and satisfactory, they must not stop here, but take each stopping point as a starting point for new achievements and if they were right, to have the dogged courage to keep going.

He said if the future looked dark, they would meet life better if they fulfilled the present to the best of their ability, and that it was more important to fight well than to conquer.

Prizes were presented by Mayor Bruce H. Yeo, Mrs. Lorne Wigginton representing the women's institute; Mrs. J.D. MacLeod, representing the home and school association and Archie Hickey representing Trinity Church Men's Association.

South Shore, Annapolis Valley, St. John River Valley, Bay of Chaleur: Cloudy with a few showers; little change in temperature; southerly winds 15. Low-high at Yarmouth 45 and 65, Kentville and Fredericton 45 and 75, Saint John 47 and 65, Edmundston and cloudiness with a few showers; in Campbellton 45 and 70.
