

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

A bill to do away with personal canvassing by candidates or their agents and other election reforms will be introduced. THE STANLEY is not moving to-day. The time for laying up to clean boilers has not yet been decided upon, but it will be some time between the 15th and 22nd inst. The exact date will be announced when decided upon. THE MAYORALTY.—The supporters of T. A. McLean for the office of Mayor will meet to-morrow night, at 8 o'clock, in McKay Woolen Co's. old store, north side Queen Square, to arrange final committees for election day. A full attendance is necessary to success. ANOTHER STORM.—Another snowstorm set in about seven o'clock on Saturday evening and continued throughout yesterday and well into last night. The wind was from the north and north-west, the average velocity being about twenty-seven miles an hour. The snow-fall on the level was about 13 inches. During the storm the highest temperature recorded was 29 above zero and the lowest 7 below.

CITY COUNCIL MEETING.—It is understood that although the usual notices of meeting were served, there will be no session of the City Council this evening. "You have no more right to attend the meeting called for to-night than has that man there," said Mayor Haviland in reply to a question asked by ex-Councillor Beer, pointing as he spoke to a man passing by. "According to the law," said the Mayor, "the old Councilors go out when their successors are elected."

SENIORS ISSUED.—Two summonses were today served on George Carver, saloon-keeper, Kent Street, for selling intoxicants during the prohibited hours between Saturday night and Sunday morning. The summonses are returnable on Wednesday. A young lad named Harry Gates has been summoned to answer a charge of assaulting another young lad named Bertie Burton with a bar of soap. The case comes up for trial to-morrow.

HER COLLAR BONE BROKEN.—Mrs. Pierre Doyle and her two daughters reside in a tenement house on the Malpas Road near Hobkirk's old brewery premises. One of the daughters named Mary, is somewhat weak-minded, and in one way or another has caused a good deal of trouble in the house. On Saturday morning she became very violent, and brandishing a poker threatened to strike her sister. The sister caught her by the shoulders, and in the struggle which followed, it is said the unfortunate girl fell against a large breaking her collar bone. Dr. Conroy was called in and attended to the injuries.

MOVEMENTS OF THE TRAINS.—The storm was very severe along the line of railway, and some heavy drifts are reported. The Cape Traverse train did not leave here last night on account of the storm, but left this morning at 9.20, but had not arrived at Wilshire up to one o'clock this afternoon. The western train which left here at 10 a. m., was delayed at Royal Junction up to one o'clock, pending the arrival at Wilshire of the Cape Traverse train. The train which left Tignish this morning was not reported at Alberton at one o'clock. Some train did not move out to-day, and the train from Georgetown did not leave Cardigan until after eleven to-day.
