FARM SOLD AT LITTLE YORK.—The farm of the late Mr. Hardy was sold by Auction last week, and purchased by Mr. Richard Vasey. It contains fifty-six acres, with house and building, attached, and was sold for \$1,520. Mrs. Hardy will leave the District.

At a meeting of the Executive Committee of the Dominion Rifle Association, Saturday, it was decided to distribute twenty-five of the fifty Martini-Henry rifles received since the Wimbledon match. Two hundred rounds of ammunition will be given with each gun.

THE Summerside Pioneer objects to passenger steamers carrying large numbers of live stock. It says the stench arising from the lower deck is intolerable, and permeates every part of the vessel. The Pioneer hopes a mail and passenger boat will be immediately put on the route between Summerside and Shediac.

THE Mechanics Institute, St. John, has completed arrangements for a splendid course of lectures during the coming season. Among other on the programme we find the name of Rev. G. W. Hodgson, who has chosen for his subject "The Heroes of Lost Causes," and Professor J. G. Schurman, who will lecture on "Milton."

CANADA has a large number of post-mistresses and post-mistresses. A statistician tells the number to be two hundred and thirty, of whom sixty-five are single and one hundred and sixty-five are married. They are most numerous in Ontario, which has 75; Nova Scotia has 58; Quebec and New Brunswick, 38 each; P. E. Island has 11; Manitoba 5, and British Columbia 4.

THEY grow big turnips in Ontario. Some sizes are given as follows:—W. Abbott, North Duro, pulled an Aberdeen Swede measuring 36 1/2 inches circumference, and weighing 26 lb; Mr. John Bolton, of Guelph, pulled six which averaged over 24 pounds each, the heaviest weighing 24 1/2 pounds, and the lightest 24 pounds. There were upwards of 50 bushels taken from the field in which the turnips would have averaged 29 pounds each.

LAST Friday night, the Pioneer reports, a horse was stolen from the stable of Mr. Barlow, Elfriskie, driven to Alberton and sold to a horse-buyer who shipped him down here on the Saturday night train. The owner being on the lock-out, recognized the animal when the train stopped at some of the stations on the road, got on board train, took out a warrant on arriving at Summerside and secured his horse, leaving the buyer to get his money from the thief as best he could.

STANHOPE NEW METHODIST CHURCH.—This building is rapidly approaching completion. Already it has been plastered by Mr. William Brehaut, and the outside has received a first coat of paint. The carpenter work has been done in good style, by Messrs. W. Auld and C. Boyver. Mr. P. Lee, of the city, has received the job of pointing and finishing the inside. Standing on an excellent site, the building presents a pleasing appearance. It is intended to open it for public worship sometime in December.

AN AMERICAN GAMBLER.—A certain T. F. Walton, an American, has been engaging in heavy betting transactions on the British turf, thereby earning the title of Plunger Walton. At Sandown Park on one day he lost a bet of £6,000 sterling; he recovered half this by another bet, but soon lost his \$3,000 by a third. The Sporting Times gives expression to strong suspicions that the said Walton had dealings with the trainers in certain stables, and says that the Duchess of Montrose spoke her mind very freely on the subject. Plunger Walton won £5,000 on one horse in the race, and his owner won nothing at all.
