

Junior Abbies Force Three-Way Tie For Third Place With 5-4 Victory

As a result of the tie, the Abbies moved into a tie with the Charlot and Bridges Juniors and M. C. A. Each team has 12 points.

Benny Carson allowed only four singles in picking up his fourth league win. He surrendered three singles in the third inning when Holman's scored their only earned run. He gave another base hit in the fourth. He struck out 14 and walked three.

The Abbies scored their winning run with two out in the sixth inning. Farley on his first try to the plate drew a base on balls and went to second on Dave MacLeod's infield out. 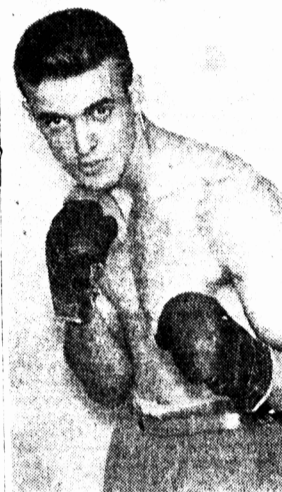

Thompson Declines Offer To Sell Babe Britton

George Thompson, the owner of the great free-legged pacing mare Babe Britton, turned down a good offer for the sale of the Babe yesterday afternoon to Joseph Moreau of Rimouski, Quebec.

Mr. Moreau, who owns a number of outstanding horses including Peach Butter, arrived in Charlottetown yesterday to purchase the Babe. Babe Britton took a new record at the Charlottetown Driving Park last Saturday night by pacing the mile in 2:08 4-5.

Mr. Thompson, however, has no intention of selling the Babe. "She's the greatest mare in the Maritimes today. I don't know where you would find another Maritime-bred mare like her," he stated yesterday afternoon.

Mr. Thompson has a strong feeling towards Babe Britton. Although his home is in Summerside, Mr. Thompson lives at the Charlottetown Driving Park in the summer months and he bunked next to the stall occupied by the Babe.

The attraction towards the Babe goes back a long way. Mr. Thompson owned the Babe's mother, Maudie. She was a good two-year-old trotter with a mark around 2:14, but she went blind. He later sold her to George Crozier of Hamilton, Ontario.

The Babe was born in Hamilton although bred on the Island by Abbe Worthly. Mr. Thompson purchased the Babe as a three-year-old and for more than a year used her extensively driving in a wagon throughout the Province.

He always took excellent care of the young mare and every time he called at a farm house the Babe got a feed of oats. When he returned home in the evening she was given plenty of grass and given the opportunity to cool out after the day's driving. In this way she developed into a strong mare and developed the stamina which she shows on the racing tracks today.

The Babe is 11 years old. Last fall at Truro, N.S. she drove her to a mark of 2:09 2-5. On Saturday night she paced the first mile of the Free For All in 2:09 and the second dash in 2:08 4-5.

There are no fenders; the car is stripped of all upholstery, no glass is allowed in the windows, but they may have (which very few have) a shatter-proof windshield in front of them. The drivers must wear crash helmets and be secured in their seat with a safety belt.

Last night saw plenty of spills and crashes; one of the cars went on fire but miraculously no one was injured.

In the second race Don Warren's car went into a skid crossways on a turn and Ivan Laird who was following close behind leap-frogged over the top of him, coming to rest on his radiator on the other side of the Warren car. Strangely enough, Laird was able to continue the race but Warren's car was badly demolished.

Laird was further involved when his name sake Bobby Laird took a nose dive into the bank and while he was in a vertical position, Ivan passed under, only to be caught by Bobby's car as it came to rest on all fours.

The fourth race, although it was minus the mishaps which accompanied the second, saw some great competition among the drivers as they changed positions time after time during the twelve laps. Young Frankie Acorn led the field, and carried off the checkered flag at the end of the race. For a new driver this young man displayed wonderful skill and coolness in piloting his machine to victory over a field of much more experienced drivers.
