Ont. Printing Trade Unions Critical On Magazine Issue

OTTAWA (CP)—The federal government and two American-based magazines, Time and Reader's Digest, were sharply criticized Saturday by Ontario's printing trades unions.

Delegates at a two-day conference of the Ontario Federation of Printing Trades Unions voted 19-10 for a resolution condemning the Liberal government for allowing the "dumping" of American magazines, including Time and Reader's Digest, in Canada.

At the same time, they urged full action on the proposals of the O'Leary royal commission designed to protect Canadian periodicals against competition from foreign publications.

About 40 delegates representing 22 locals of eight printing trades unions attended the weekend conference. The federation is made up of about 100 locals representing some 1,000 printers and other graphic arts workers in Ontario.

The approved resolution after John C. Munro, parliamentary secretary for the Minister LaMarsh, said the government's legislation to assist Canadian periodicals must be supported to preserve Canada's identity.

COULD LOSE IDENTITY — Canada could lose its economic and political independence unless its communications media—magazines, the press and TV—was held in Canadian hands, he said.

Mr. Munro said the government was proceeding with a resolution in the Commons spelling out plans to discourage Canadian advertising in foreign publications.

government and I'm supporting this (Commons) resolution." After Mr. Munro left, several delegates expressed confusion about the government's position.

"I'm just as confused as when he started," said Mrs. Betty Whitaker, Toronto, vice-president of the Ontario federation.

Said Tom Osborne, Toronto, a local officer of the International Printing Pressmen and Assistants Union: "He moved one point — the government doesn't know what the hell it's doing either."

REFLECTS ANGER — The split over action to protect Canadian magazines reflected trade union concern over safeguarding jobs of workers who print the Canadian editions of Time and Reader's Digest.

One delegate said that by attacking the two magazines the federation was actually giving aid to Maclean-Burner publications and its non-union operators.

"It's all wrong to say we should forget about the O'Leary report because we're helping our magazines," said John Duncan, a Toronto stenographer who heads the Toronto Allied Printing Trades Council.

"We want Canadian periodicals to be owned and operated by Canadians and printed in their entirety in Canada."

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
