In his annual business report, Canada's Minister of Trade and Commerce, Rt. Hon. C. D. Howe, above, passed judgment on Canada's economic record for 1951 and found little wanting. The Trade Minister emphasized that Canada was one of few western countries who were able to meet increased demand and still retain a balanced economy. He added that in the first seven months of fiscal year 1951-52 defence orders of \$1,326,000,000 have been placed. In addition he disclosed that in last five years \$2,500,000,000 has been spent in Canada on development of our natural resources, most of this in fields essential to the defence of the free world. Looking to the future, Mr. Howe forecast tremendous economic growth in Canada, with such large-scale projects as the St. Lawrence seaway and creation of greatly increased aluminum and steel manufacturing facilities slated for near future.
