

# Mr. What Goes In 11-2 Favorite

LONDON (AP)—British bookies were almost unanimously agreed Friday night that Mr. What will win the Grand National steeplechase today and the other 35 horses in the race hardly count.

The bookies hammered the odds on Mr. What to 11-2 at their final betting session Friday night. He was 9-1 earlier in the week and 6-1 on Wednesday night.

The 11th National begins at 11:15 a.m. AST over Aintree's 4 1/4-mile course.

Mr. What, owned by David Couglin, an American living in Ireland, was a much shorter betting proposition than second-favored Slippery Serpent, a 9-1 bet.

Oxo was 10-1, Wyndburgh 100-1 and Green Drill and Done Up 100-1.

## OTHER TOP ODDS

Other leading odds were Nic Atkins 18-1, Turmoil 20-1, Tiberetta, Mr. Gay and Oscar Wilde 25-1. Odds on Wyndburgh and Tiberetta lengthened because of the going. They are slow but sure jumpers and today's event over 30 big jumps should be a fast one on the firm turf course.

Record-time for this 122-year-old race is nine minutes, 20 1/2 seconds by Golden Miller in 1924.

# Blake Tells Squawkers To Jump In The Lake

MONTREAL (CP)—Coach Toe Blake said Friday that goalie Jacques Plante will return to the nets only when the club doctor approves and that those leading the loud squawks from other clubs "can go take a jump in the lake."

"They're acting like two-bit guys; they've been in hockey long enough to know better," snapped the riled Blake. "Something should be done about it."

"If the doctor says Plante can play here Saturday against Boston Bruins, he'll play. If he can play Sunday in New York, even for part of the game, he'll play. If people think I want to lay Plante off for three games with the playoffs coming up, they ought to have their heads read. I'm sick and tired of any suggestion that we're not doing our best."
