Penitentiary Terms Given Jail Breakers

Kings County Stipendiary Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, holding court at Georgetown yesterday sentenced David Smith of Charlottetown and David Wilfred Larkin of Armadale to two years in Dorchester penitentiary when they pleaded guilty to escaping from Kings County Jail at Georgetown.

Their penitentiary sentences are to run concurrently with the sentences they are now serving in Kings County Jail for a series of breaks and thefts.

Henry Wilson Moore of Cambridge, represented by William A. Reddin, charged with forgery and obtaining money by false pretences, had both his cases adjourned to June 3.

James Stephen Murphy and Carl Wetber Collins, both of Sturgeon and charged with impaired driving had their cases adjourned to June 10 and June 8 respectively. They were represented by Lester P. O'Donnell.

John Preston MacDonald, Murray River, charged with operating a motor vehicle not equipped with brakes, had his case adjourned to June 3 at his own request.

David Roy Jamieson, Sturgeon, charged with care and control of a motor vehicle while impaired, had his case adjourned to July 8 on the request of his counsel, Mr. Reddin, for the convenience of the accused and witnesses who are lobster fishermen.

Guy Allan Graham of Murray Harbor North and Charles Michael Burke of Montague, both charged with impaired driving, had their cases adjourned to June 3.

There were two cases of illegal possession and one of intoxication in public.

Local Man Practicing In N.S. Town

D. Frank Sigsworth, son of Mr. and Mrs. F. F. Sigsworth, Haviland St., Charlottetown, has entered into the practice of law at Port Hawkesbury, N.S. He is an associate of J. D. MacLennan and is conducting his practice while he is absent from Nova Scotia as counsel for the board of trustees of the Maritime Transportation Union, at Ottawa.

A graduate of St. Dunstan's University, Mr. Sigsworth later studied at Dalhousie University Law School, the London School of Economics and Political Science of the University of London, and has lectured at Loyola College, Montreal, St. Mary's University, Halifax, and the University of Ottawa Law School.

He received his master of arts degree from University of Montreal, and his master of laws degree from Dalhousie for study of Canadian Constitutional Law.

In addition, he served a tour of duty as an infantry officer in the Canadian Army and held the rank of captain in his reserve.

He practiced law in Halifax and later in Charlottetown with the firm of Poake and Nicholson.

The club must have a clearly defined basis of membership and reason for existence other than selling liquor. The premises are to be of the highest standard in the furnishings, equipment and services. The club license provides for the keeping of a register in which the names and addresses of members are recorded and in which shall be entered the name and address of every member entering the club, the date of such entry and the name of the member bringing a guest into the club.

No persons shall be permitted in the club as a guest unless accompanied by a member, neither shall a club permit any person under the age of 21 to enter a club room or rooms in which liquor is being served. According to the regulations, it shall be the duty and responsibility of the licensee or person in charge to enforce these regulations and "he shall demand that a birth certificate be shown by anyone he suspects of being under 21 years of age before that person is allowed to enter the club."

Other provisions provide for the licensing of military carriers, reserves of the Royal Canadian Navy, Army, Air Force, the quarters of the RCMP, branches of the Royal Canadian Legion, Naval and Air Force Veterans Association.

Full provision is made in the new regulations for the elimination, in premises operating under the Liquor Control Act, of disorderly conduct, intoxication, serving of liquor to minors, slot machine operation or gambling of any kind. The regulations say that licensed premises must have a high standard of facilities, complete comfort and space and must observe sanitary conditions as provided under the regulations of the Public Health Act.
