**Link Between Base and Aircraft**

Corporal R. N. MacKenzie of Charlottetown, P. E. I., is shown sending a message in Morse code to a Summerside-based aircraft flying somewhere over the Atlantic. Corporal MacKenzie is a radio operator and is one of a staff which keeps in contact with aircraft out on regular training exercises. This is a vital link for the crew in the aircraft as they must be kept informed of altering weather conditions. The radio operator on the aircraft must in turn keep the base regularly informed of the plane's position. Equipment of this type will be on display at the Centennial Aviation Show to be held at the Charlottetown Airport on July 2. The public is invited to come and see the ground displays and flying activities.
