Strike Continues, Support Pledged

The strike of local 721C of the International Union of Operating Engineers at A. Pickard Machinery Ltd. enters its fifth day with no sign of a settlement. Overtime rates of pay remain the key issue with the union asking time-and-a-half for hours worked beyond 30 hours each week. The company wants to continue to pay straight time with employees having a choice whether to work overtime or not.

The president of the Charlottetown and District Labor Council, Alex MacLean, said the council has pledged support to the strikers.

Mr. MacLean said the union will receive a contribution from the "Joint Protective Fund" set up by the Labor Council for the purpose of aiding strikers.

He said it was hoped that this contribution would "bolster the strike fund (from the national and international unions) to almost equal the wages" of some 15 strikers, who began picketing last Thursday.

'S'ide Groups Prepare Protest Resolutions

SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN — A resolution protesting the possible closure of RCAF Station Summerside was passed by the local Branch of the Royal Canadian Legion last night at a special meeting attended by approximately 200 members.

The three-page resolution, protesting the closure that "would effect most seriously the livelihood and financial well being of a large number of veterans and also seriously affect the economy of this province in general and the town of Summerside in particular", was prepared by a special legion committee over the weekend chaired by James Hogan.

Authorization was given by the executive of the legion to send two delegates to Ottawa to protest the closing of the base, if the situation was deemed necessary.

The Summerside Board of Trade executive met last evening to make plans for the preparation of a report concerning the base within the next day or two. The report is to be presented to the federal government at a later date, and a telegram was sent to Solicitor-General J. Watson MacNaught saying that such information was being compiled.

The day is listed as a statutory holiday by the province in its Interpretation Act, and is set aside to honor the memory of those who served and died in our wars.
