## TROUBLE IS NOW BEGINNING.

### Friction Between Russians and Americans.

#### GENERAL CHAFFEE DOES NOT APPROVE OF LOOTING.

Street-Fighting and Fires Prevail in Peking City.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

LONDON, Aug. 24.—Fresh fighting and dissensions are apparently following in the wake of the relief of Peking.

The Daily Mail publishes a despatch from the Chinese capital, dated as late as the 17th of August, declaring that a great fire was then raging in the Imperial city.

The Russian commanders had declined to accept the decision of the other generals not to violate the Imperial precincts, and still fighting was going on.

General Chaffee, so it is asserted, maintained that the Chinese had been adequately punished already, and that it would be unwise to take the Imperial palace. This explains the withdrawal of the Americans after the breaching of the three gates, as cabled by the Associated Press.

The Russian General however, maintained that his Government had declared war against China and that therefore there was no reason to prevent him carrying hostilities into the sacred precincts.

Judging from various despatches that have reached Europe this morning from Peking, the commanders eventually adopted a middle course, for a telegram asserts that sentries were placed over the Imperial city to prevent looting.

Hence it is presumed that the Imperial buildings, although captured, will not be destroyed. The fire appears to be incendiary, and to be caused by the Chinese themselves.

All despatches point to the fact that when the latest message was received here that the Peking commanders were somewhat at sea regarding further action, all awaiting instructions from their governments. Neither commanders nor diplomats were in communication with the Chinese government. They were then searching for Prince Tuan.

#### IS DISGUSTED WITH POLITICS.

Grit Machine Too Much for Mr. Comstock, of Brockville.

TORONTO, Aug. 22.—Mr. W. H. Comstock, whom the Grit machine elected in Brockville by methods which all the world has since heard about, still adheres to his express determination not to run again. Mr. Comstock is tired of politics and no wonder. He expected to be made a Senator, but that job was given to another. Then he was placated by being elected to the House of Commons, but in Ottawa he found himself a mere cipher. During his career as a member Mr. Comstock has never made a speech nor expressed an opinion. His reason for quitting is cogent, even if it is not complimentary to his political friends. "The machine," says he, "has caused so much abuse to be heaped upon me that I am determined to get out of the running at all hazards."

"BE READY FOR WAR,"

Is King Charles of Roumania's Coun-  
sel to His Troops.

LONDON, Aug. 22.—Referring to the tension between Roumania and Bulgaria, caused by the demand of the Roumanian Government for the arrest of Sarafow, president of the revolutionary committee of Sofia, the Bulgarian capital, together with the suppression of that organization, the Vienna correspondent of the Daily Express says:

The Bulgarian reply to the note of Roumania has been received at Bucharest. It is couched in aggressive terms.

Bulgarian troops are being continually moved to the frontier.

The Macedonian revolutionary committee has collected 1,000 volunteers under the command of Bulgarian regular officers, and will raid Roumanian territory.

The Roumanian army corps are mobilizing. King Charles, speaking to his officers on Sunday said:

"Gentlemen, be ready for war. It can happen at any moment. You will prove yourselves worthy successors of the heroes of 1877."

Addressing the minister of foreign affairs, he said:

"Thus do the ungrateful Bulgarians repay all the blood we shed for them in 1877."

The Roumanian minister at Sofia will be immediately recalled.
