THE TURF.—A comparatively complete list of the winning owners of the turf during the legitimate season of 1892, which closed to-day at Morris Park, says a New York despatch, shows that Mr. Frank Elmer leads, with \$256,948 to his credit, M. F. Dwyer coming second on the list with \$122,296.37 won. Marcus Daly ranking third with \$116,360.

LOBSTERS AND CODFISH.—An Ottawa despatch says: "The lobster catch of the past season, taking the whole region around P. E. I., up the Gulf shore and in the Bay Chaleur, according to the latest advices at the fisheries department, is estimated to be from 40 to 50 per cent. less than in former years. This is largely owing to the fact that the season was a rough one along the exposed part of the coast, and unfavorable for fishing. In Bay Chaleur, which is more sheltered, the catch was pretty well up to the average. The cod-fishery was excellent up to August, but it has since fallen off, and the total catch will probably fall 10 per cent. short of last year's."

Ottawa Notes

OTTAWA, Oct. 20.

The following appointments on the Intercolonial Railway have been announced: F. R. F. Brown, mechanical superintendent; J. J. Wallace, general freight agent; John M. Lyons, general passenger agent; vice Whitney, Taylor and Busby, superannuated.

Lieut. Cook, Picton, has been appointed to the Royal School of Artillery.

The election in St. J. k. Manitoba, will take place on Nov. 10th. Colonel Villiera, recently suspended, has been reprimanded and reinstated.

Hon. Mr. Conigan has received a silver mounted blackhorn from Ireland, bearing the following inscription:

"A small token of appreciation of his power, influence and services on behalf of Home Rule for Ireland. William O'Brien, John Dillon, Thomas Esmond."

On a silver plate on the handle is engraved the arms of the city of Cork, and underneath it is a silver harp wreathed in shamrocks.

Cholera in France.

PARIS, Oct. 20.

Dr. Broudale reports that the outbreak of cholera in Marseilles resulted from the pollution of drinking water with the sewerage. The total number of deaths from cholera in France since April was 3,184.

Queen's University.

KINGSTON, Oct. 20.

Rev. Dr. Grant announces an increased attendance at Queen's University. He reports over bequests of \$3,000 from late A. P. Fullon, of Toronto, and \$4,000 from late John T. Roberts, of Ottawa.

Football.

HALIFAX, Oct. 20.

A football match played yesterday between the Wanderers and the Garrison, was won by the former, 7 points to 0.

General Telegraphic News.

TORONTO, Oct. 18.—Dr. Barnard has contracted small pox in a case recently breaking out in the general hospital. Dr. Middleboro and a nurse have also contracted the disease. All three have been removed to the small pox hospital.

LONDON, Oct. 18.—A Rome despatch says the Pope has warned France that unless its aggressive policy against the Vatican is abandoned, the next batch of French cardinals will be the last.

HONG KONG, Oct. 18.—The chief officer of the Peninsular and Oriental Steam Navigation Company's steamer B. Khara, lost during the typhoon on Sand Island, has arrived here. He reports that the steamer struck at midnight of Oct. 10th. The steamer ran into the storm before dark and would probably have come through all right had it not been for the seas bearing her. He never saw such a tremendous sea running. When the steamer struck she sank almost immediately. Her spar deck was awash. If it had not been for this, probably every soul on board would have been lost. Of the crew 102 are missing.

MONTREAL, Oct. 18.—The Baie des Chaleurs railway, of political fame, is progressing rapidly. The first 60 miles will be opened for traffic about the middle of November, and completed to Pasphebec by the end of the year. The promoters now claim that the road will become an important link in the short route to Europe. From Port Daniel, 120 miles from the junction of the road with the Intercolonial, it is 200 miles to the west coast of Newfoundland, and with a railway across the island they pretend the time will be shorter than by any other route.

DENVER, Col., Oct. 18.—Further reports of loss of life and cattle from the terrible storm of Tuesday and Wednesday are being received. Along the Rock Island railroad, between the Colorado Springs and the Kansas line, the storm was at its worst. Near Falcon a Rock Island track walker was frozen to death, while a short distance from Matison three hundred sheep were found dead and their herder was discovered nearly frozen to death. Three hundred cattle froze to death between Colorado Springs and Limon. At Rosalia, Eastern Colorado, an unknown laborer was found dead from exposure. In the city of Colorado Springs Charles Beattie died from the effects of the storm. Near Boulder, in Northern Colorado, J. V. Wolf, a miner, was found frozen to death.

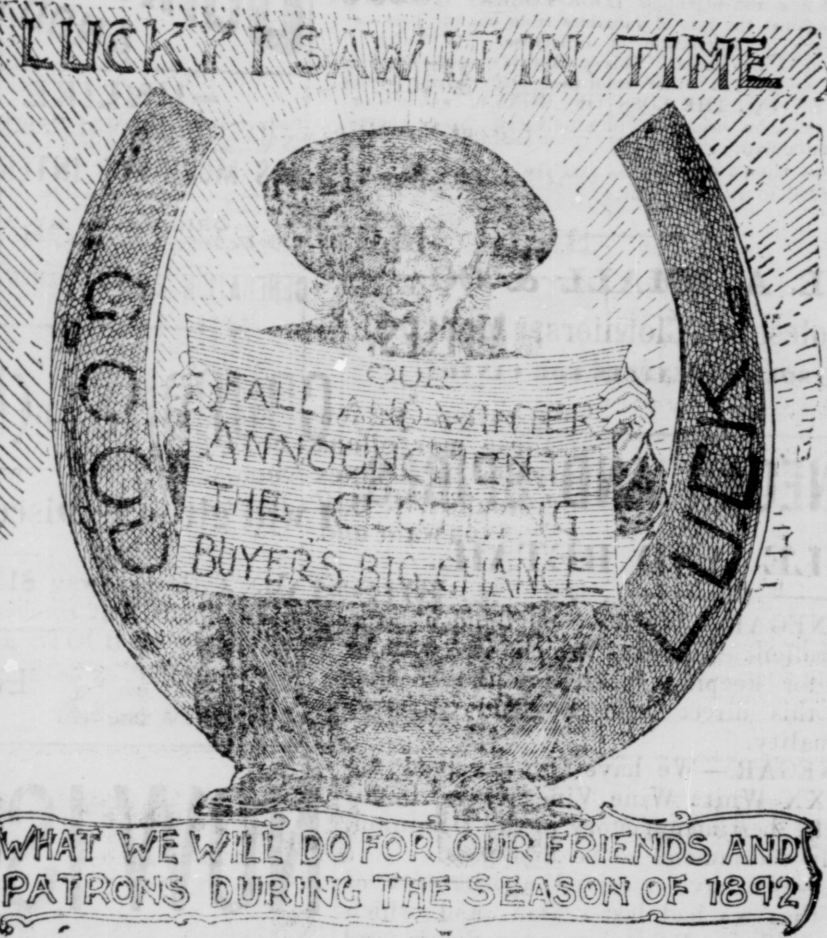
