Former Member Of Legislature Passes Away

There passed peacefully away at the King's County Hospital Saturday evening, Roderick McLellan of St. Georges in his 87th year. The deceased was born at St. Georges, the son of the late Donald McLellan and Anne (MacIntyre) McLellan, and followed farming throughout his life. He became interested in politics, and in 1917 sat in the Provincial Legislature for the Conservative Party. He was defeated at the next election and later took charge of the old age pension assistance which was started at that time. Besides his sorrowing widow, nee Mary McCormack, he leaves to mourn three brothers, Monsignor G. J. McLellan, Summerside, Rev. Pius J. McLellan, Winnipeg, and John Andrew Broadbent, Sask. A sister, Mrs. Chrystom McCormack, St. Georges, also survives. The funeral service will take place from St. Georges Church, Tuesday morning at 10 a.m. Interment will be in the church cemetery.

"CARRIE" RANKS WITH SCREEN'S GREATEST ROMANTIC DRAMAS

William Wyler's production of "Carrie" the Paramount film romance which opens today at the Prince Edward Theatre, stars Jennifer Jones and Laurence Olivier in a screen entertainment fully worthy of their talents. It is adult, it is provocative and it is intensely moving. The entire production recalls the intelligence and integrity that made Wyler's "Detective Story" such an exciting cinema experience, and the performances of Miss Jones and Olivier struck this reviewer as perhaps the finest of their careers—certainly the best pair of portrayals seen in a single picture all season. The stirring love story of "Carrie" is based on Theodore Dreiser's classic best-seller, "Sister Carrie." The plot traces the transformation of a simple, small-town girl into a stage beauty whose romance involvements bring censure on herself and worse to many of the men in her life. At first awed by the easy temptations of big city life, Carrie (Miss Jones) soon learns to use men in her struggle for a career. She takes up with a brash young salesman (Eddie Albert), then has a tempestuous romance with the distinguished and successful Hurstwood (Olivier). In a desperate bid to hold a love more intense and compelling than any he has ever known Hurstwood risks his wealth, position and family. The ultimate destinies of the ambitious beauty and her married suitor make for an overwhelmingly powerful climax. The many love scenes in "Carrie" come wonderfully alive under the spell of Wyler's inspired direction and the stars' inspired performances. Olivier's characterization of the middle-aged man in the spell of an irresistible woman is a brilliantly mature piece of acting that evokes deep concern and compassion for the character. Miss Jones is a visual delight and professionally flawless in a difficult role, while Miriam Hopkins, as the outraged wife, and Eddie Albert lend excellent support to an exciting and sensitive drama.

Milton Hornets Defeat Montague In Exhibition

Over 400 spectators watched the Montague Shmohawks go down to defeat 14-4 before the Milton Hornets in an exhibition game played at the Montague Rink Saturday night. The hard-working Milton squad outplayed the locals, capitalizing on many chances to take a commanding lead early in the game.
