TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.] A Telephone Company.

NEW YORK, July 3. The certificate of incorporation of Drawbaugh Telephone Telegraph Company of Canada, was filed to-day. The capital stock is fixed at \$100,000. The lines of the Company are to run from this city to Albany, Buffalo, Windsor, Ont, Hamilton, Toronto, Montreal; then to begin again at Albany, to run to Rouse's Point, New York, Quebec, Halifax, and thence to different States and Territories of United States and Canada, and across over other countries of the Western Hemisphere. The certificate of incorporation of the North America Insulated Cable Company was also filed to-day. The incorporators are the same as those of the Drawbaugh Company, mentioned above. The capital stock of the Company is \$1,000,000. The object of the company is to construct lines of Telegraph and Electric Cables in the United States and Canada, and run cables to the coast of Europe.

Cholera.

MARSEILLES, July 3. At eight o'clock this morning three deaths from cholera had been reported during the night. At least 6,000 of the inhabitants have fled from the city. Four hundred poor workmen from Toulon have been sent back to that city. The panic is unquestionably increasing. In the face of this fact, however, the physicians and chemists of the city have held a meeting and declared the alarm is senseless, the rate of mortality at present they say does not exceed that which is usual at periods of great heat.

Khartoum Captured.

LONDON, July 3. A despatch from Cairo to the Telegraph says that letters have been received there from Khartoum, stating that the place was captured during the latter part of May without difficulty. There was no massacre. Most of the Europeans turned Mohammedan. Among those who did not was Gen. Gordon, who is quite safe, and allowed the freedom of militia camp. The Mahdi himself is at Khartoum. The Europeans are well treated.

Half-Breeds.

WINNIPEG, Man., July 4. Louis Riel is at St. Laurent, where the French and English half-breeds have assembled to confer with him regarding their claims. They want the river front, land of survey along the Saskatchewan, and the same terms as were granted Manitoba half-breeds. There are various surmises as to the result of Riel's visit.

A Strike.

ROME, July 3. Agricultural laborers in the Osanian and Manturan provinces have struck for higher wages. The Government commissioners of enquiry attribute the existing depression to the sale of crown land, to the effects of brigandage and to American and Indian competition. The commission deprecates a recourse to a protective policy.

Great Fires.

KINGSTON, Ont., July 3. Fires in the back country, and principally in the vicinity of the Mississippi Station, are still burning. McLaren's mills were saved by the wind changing. 1,000,000 feet of lumber was destroyed.

France and China.

LONDON, July 3. There seems little doubt that war will recommence between France and China. An influential party in China are instigating it.
