**PRIDE OF MARYLAND**

"Pride of Maryland," Republic's latest offering, which opens Thursday at the Capitol Theatre, combines horse-racing thrills and a heart-warming love story for entertainment satisfaction.

The story takes place at the turn of the century and has to do mainly with the riding career of jockey Frankie Longworth, portrayed by Stanley Clements. Her husband, Steve, played by Frankie Darro, is killed when he attempts to ride "crouch" style in spite of a bad knee. Unknown to Christine and her small son, Frankie has been sending large sums of money to Christine's father.
