NOTICE TO CHEESE MAKERS.—Cheese makers who may have intended visiting the experimental station which has been established at the Riverside factory, under Prof. Robertson, of the C. E. F., are hereby notified that the superintendent, Mr. J. A. Ruddick, will be absent for a few weeks attending the leading fall fairs. It is to be regretted that while cheesemakers came long distances to receive instructions and note experiments that more of the cheese makers of the neighboring factories did not avail themselves of the same opportunity. Moore, will remain at the station in his absence, and he in conjunction with Mr. James McCann, who is doing so much to further the interest of the factory, will be most happy to give any information in their power to visiting cheesemakers.

It speaks well for the young man to be able to take charge of the factory in the absence of the Superintendent, as it was only this spring that he went to Ontario to learn the art of cheese and butter-making. ### Divorce Refused by Rome.

FINAL DECISION IN THE GRANT MATRIMONIAL CONTROVERSY.

HARTFORD, Ct., Sept. 17.—There has just been received here notice of the decision at Rome, August 11, of a famous matrimonial controversy which has been in the courts of the Roman Catholic Church for four years. William Grant, of Bridgeport, separated from his wife, formerly Mary Reilly, and a divorce was secured in the Connecticut courts.

The couple had been united by a Methodist minister, but Grant subsequently joined the Church of Rome, to which his wife belonged. He applied for an ecclesiastical divorce, claiming that a Methodist marriage was not recognized by the church. The board, after a careful hearing, presided over by Very Rev. James Hughes, V. G., of this city, in 1887, declared the marriage was valid. The archiepiscopal tribunal in Boston was applied to by Grant, and there the question was appealed finally to Rome, and the highest authority now declares the marriage binding and the divorce is refused.

The case attracted considerable attention in Roman Catholic circles, and is the first of its kind in this state. Grant has for some years been living with a second wife.

### News Notes.

Toronto has been gratified with a grant of \$5,000 to equip a killed battalion of militiamen.

The agents in New York of the coal producing companies have ordered prices advanced 10 to 25 cents per ton on October 1st. Broken is advanced 10c., egg and stove 15c., and chestnut 25c.

The census records show that there are in the United States 12,500,000 families, and of these 10,025,000 are living in houses or on farms entirely unincumbered by any mortgage obligations.

Commenting on an article upon the Behring sealing question published in its columns, the London Times calls the American claims preposterous, and declares their action arbitrary and high-handed.

The number of people who perished in the floods in the province of Toledo, Spain, is now placed at 2,300, and the number of lives lost in other localities at 500. In addition many were injured. It is estimated the total loss from the floods will amount to £1,000,000.

C. T. Jenkins, a middle-aged and prominent member of the First Presbyterian church in St. Louis, has been arrested charged with embezzling nearly \$14,000 from his employers, Armstrong, Gilbert & Co., cork manufacturers, whose trusted cashier and bookkeeper he has been for seven years. Jenkins speculated in mining stocks, and this caused his ruin.

It is claimed the steamer M. Justice is the most economical coal burner of any of the Atlantic "high fliers." She burns 20 tons of coal a day, shows 19,500 horse power, and makes an average of over 20 knots, or 23 miles, per hour throughout the Atlantic passage. There are only two other ships that have reached this speed, namely, the duplicate ship the Teutonic and the City of Paris. But there are a few other vessels that come near this speed.

Admiral McCann, who commanded the United States squadron in Chilean waters during the war, has an article in defence of Minister Egan in the Washington Post. He says it was through Egan's intervention that leniency had been shown by Balmaceda to a number of congressionalists who had been taken prisoners. "His conduct," continues Admiral McCann, "has not been understood aright, even in this country, but I want to say that all his actions have been those of a clear-headed diplomat and an honorable man."

The reported escape of Balmaceda furnishes a strong dramatic situation in the sensational story of the Chilian war. Up among the snowy peaks of the Andes the soldiers of the Junta were watching for him, while he was hiding in Valparaiso. Having committed his money to an English warship, he threw his precious person on the mercy of the United States admiral commanding the San Francisco. Disguised as a drunken sailor he managed to get on board. No doubt the Chilian citizens who were thirsting for the blood of the ex-president will not sing the praises of Admiral Brown for the trick he had served them, but the incident is not without the excuse of sympathy, though if the charges made against the fleeing official be only half true, he must be a man of the most cruel and callous nature. Balmaceda is spoken of as a "prominent guest" of the United States commander, one of the cabins having been set apart for him.

Whoever imagines that a combination of Russian and French forces can make Great Britain retire from Egypt before she concludes to do so is miscalculating the situation. The London Times plainly enquires "whether it has ever occurred to France or to the Porte that the one thing necessary to make us 'sit tight' in Egypt would be the presence of Russian warships in the neighborhood of the Suez Canal." Continues the great organ of English opinion: "The French Foreign Office might do worse than send a caricature that appeared in a recent number of Le Charivari. A French official near the Pyramids is frantically bidding an English sentinel to go. The soldier replies: 'How can I? Look at my feet.' And behold! these have become the roots of trees, and have struck downward into the sand. If the French and the Sultan wish these roots to become a reality, they cannot do better than open the Dardanelles to the fleet which, silently and swiftly, Russia is constructing in the dockyards of Sebastopol."

Of the features of interest at the late meeting of the British Association for the advancement of Science, the explorations, travels or adventures of ladies, setting out through unknown regions, unprotected and relying on their own physical and intellectual resources, were among the principal. Mrs. French Sheldon did not read her paper in the geographical section, but entertained her hearers by a *vis a voce* account of her visit to Kilima njaro and Lake Chala, describing her extraordinary experiences on the hazardous journey which took her through tribes of naked savages. She began it without companionship, without a lieutenant to take her place, if she fell ill, without even a doctor. The command of the expedition of 130 men was undertaken wholly by herself. She had consulted Mr. Salky before starting, and had read the books of that explorer and other recent travellers. Sometimes she had to use force to obtain control of her people, occasionally resorting to the raw hide. The difficulties of her situation often kept her awake, plotting and planning what to do. Sometimes she felt that if she gave force to her impulses she would have shot every man in the caravan, but she generally found it best to cultivate patience. The record altogether is one of the most remarkable in the recent history of African explorations, and shows what women can do when they make up their minds to do it.
