New Chrome-Plating Method May Eliminate Tin From Cans

HAMILTON, Ont. (CP)—High-priced tin may lose its prima donna role in the steel industry in the foreseeable future as commercial applications of chrome-plating are developed.

This was indicated Monday by a Steel Company of Canada spokesman in confirming that the Hamilton-based steel company has signed a contract with Toyo Kohan Co. Ltd. of Tokyo to buy its technical know-how for a chrome acid method of coating metal for use in making cans.

It can be carried out at a fraction of the cost of tinplating, the Japanese announcement said.

the Stelco spokesman said. "Stelco has no plans for the immediate use of the chrome acid process; we are protecting ourselves for the future."

HAS RIGHTS
Stelco's contract gives it an exclusive licence for the use in Canada of the process, which the Tokyo steel firm calls Hitop.

Template manufacturers in North America and Europe count on the Japanese process enabling them to meet the strong competition developing in the can industry from the aluminum industry.

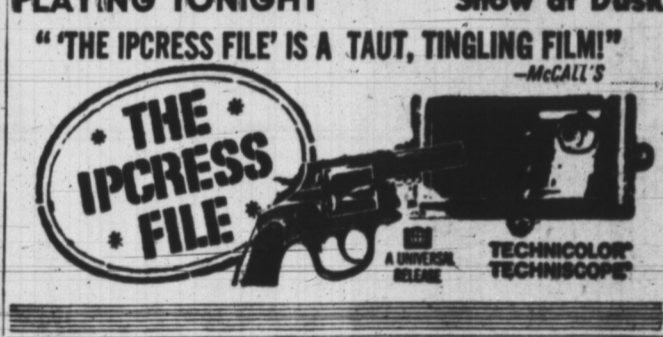
