LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

MOSE LAMBS.—The Journal reports that Mr. John Macdonald, of Leary, shipped from Summerside to St. John, on the 1st inst., 143 lambs, and to Sackville, for feeding purposes, fifty good sheep.

POLICE COURT.—This forenoon, car-drunk, Daniel Carroll, was fined \$4 or 20 days. Edward Flannigan, arrested on a warrant for an assault and battery on David McNeill, was remanded for eight days. The Scott Act cases against John H. Berr, Andrew Doyle and H. C. Connolly were further adjourned for one week owing to the absence of material witnesses.

THE NORTHERNBERLAND.—The steamer Northernberland was prevented from leaving Summerside yesterday, the 6th inst., owing to the ship Charles E. Lefurgey lying at the end of the pier, and extending some 25 feet east directly in the track of the steamer when backing out from the wharf. The Charles E. Lefurgey was aground and as the wind was blowing a gale at the time from the east forcing the steamer on to the wharf, it was impossible for the Northernberland to back out without colliding with the ship, otherwise she would have made her regular trip.
